
Message from the Chair

HIPC was established in 2009 as one of Canada's first local immigration partnerships, a network that has now spread across the country and includes more than 80 similar local tables.





In these challenging times, we cannot afford to be passive. It is the time to rise and speak up. The members of HIPC and our community partners have stepped forward, standing firm in our commitment to newcomers, offering tangible solutions through programming and innovative collaborations.

When an act of hate struck our community last fall, the response was swift and decisive. 

HIPC conducted two partner surveys in 2022 and 2024 to across the two years show progress on several outcomes.

86%	of partners agreed diversity is more celebrated in Hamilton (<i>up from 50% in 2022</i>)
64%	agreed newcomer voices and contributions are more valued (up from 40% in 2022)
100%	agreed formal organizations better support newcomers' connection to services and information (<i>up from 90% in 2022</i>)
	agreed informal networks better support newcomers' connection to services and information (<i>up from 70% in 2022</i>)
59%	agreed newcomers better understand where to go in times of need (<i>up from 35% in 2022</i>)
69%	of newcomers described their settlement experience as "excellent" or "good" (<i>HIPC immigrant survey 2023</i>)
70%	of newcomers felt "somewhat strong" or "very strong" sense of belonging in Hamilton (<i>HIPC immigrant survey 2023</i>)

As a collaborative community table, HIPC is in a unique position to focus on the collective impact of efforts to improve local settlement outcomes. To this end, in 2024 a small team of HIPC members began working with advisors from the Centre for Community Based Research. Meeting regularly from March 2024 to February 2025, with two Community Forum events, we drafted a new Community Plan to shape our focus until 2028.

HIPC's impact statement is tri-fold, focusing on making Hamilton a welcoming community where newcomers have a positive settlement experience and feel a sense of belonging.
