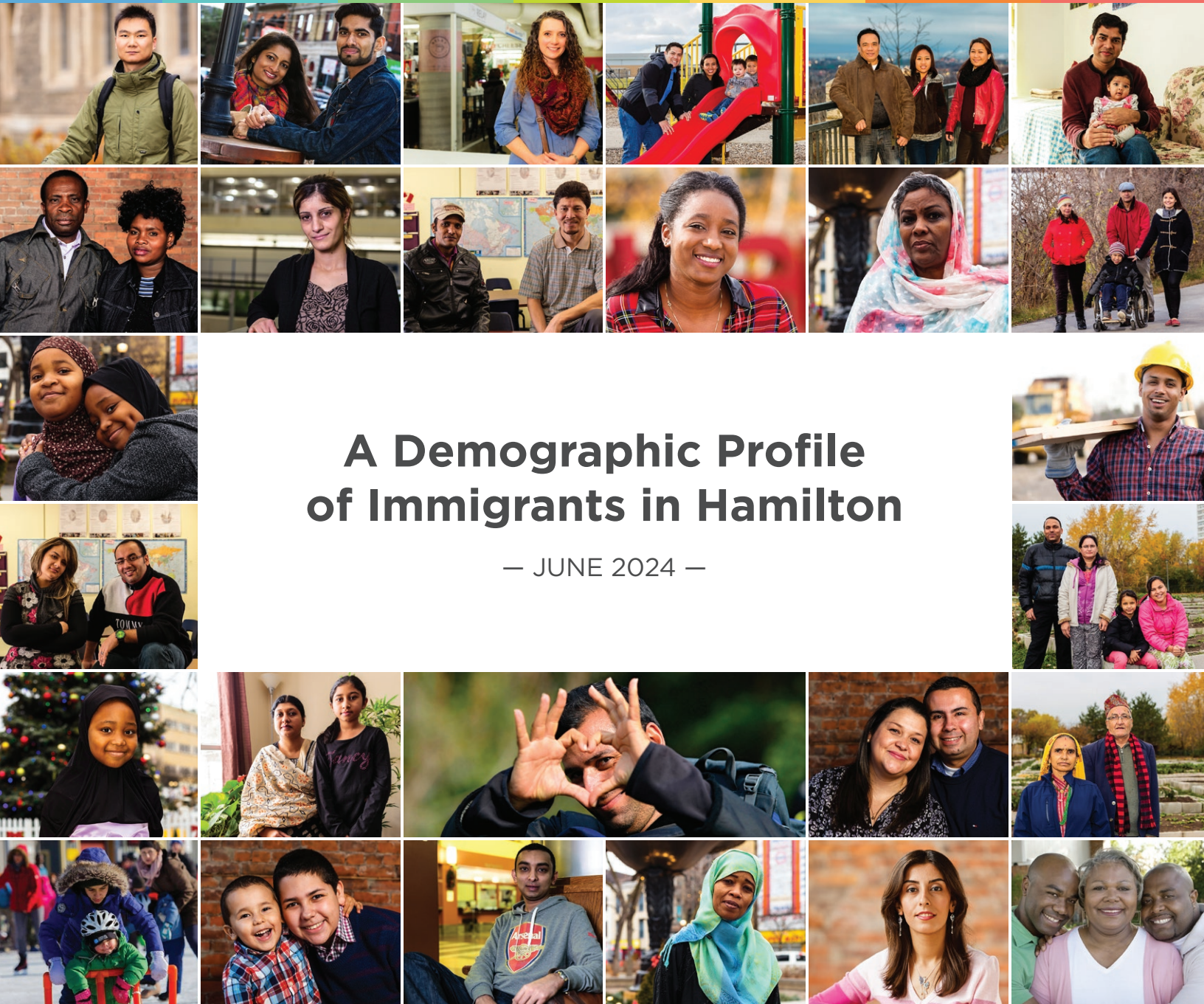

A Demographic Profile of Immigrants in Hamilton

— JUNE 2024 —

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About this Report

Hamilton's present and future continue to be shaped by immigration. Immigrants play a key role in growing Hamilton's population, contributing to the local economy, and enriching the social and cultural fabric of the city. Hamilton welcomed over 20,000 immigrants between 2016 and 2021, in addition to increasing number non-permanent residents, such as international students, temporary foreign workers and refugee claimants.

This report presents data from census 2021 on immigrants in Hamilton, including both recent and more established immigrants. Its objective is to increase our understanding of Hamilton's immigration populations, including how the characteristics of immigrants have changed over time and how Hamilton fares when compared to the province and other cities in Ontario.

In this report, "Hamilton" refers to the Hamilton Census Division which is congruent to the geographic area encompassed by the city of Hamilton. Most data in this report are derived from the 2021 Census. The report is a project led by HIPC Senior Project Manager Sarah Wayland and HIPC Program Officer Mohammad Araf and supported by the Evaluation Committee of the Hamilton Immigration Partnership Council (HIPC). Louisa Wong, Performance and Evaluation Specialist in the City of Hamilton's Healthy and Safe Communities Department, was instrumental in data analysis and presentation. About HIPC

The Hamilton Immigration Partnership Council (HIPC) is a community table whose members work together to ensure newcomers have successful settlement experiences and feel a sense of belonging in Hamilton. HIPC members represent settlement agencies, educational institutions, the private sector, municipal departments, persons with lived experiences of immigration, and more. HIPC is funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) and housed within the City of Hamilton's Economic Development Division.

Executive Summary

Population Growth and Forecasts:

- Hamilton's population is expected to exceed 800,000 by 2051. This represents approximately 40% increase from 2021 to 2051. This is slower than the projected growth in Halton and Waterloo but higher than that of Niagara.

General Immigrant Demographics:

- Close to three in 10 Hamiltonians were born outside Canada. Almost 26% of the population were immigrants, and 2.3% were non-permanent residents.
- Among recent immigrants (arrived 2016-2021), 39% were economic immigrants, 35% refugees, and 24% family sponsored immigrants.
- Two-step migration has continued to increase as 34% of recent immigrants in Hamilton were international students, temporary foreign workers, or asylum seekers prior to becoming permanent residents.
- About a quarter of the immigrant population in Hamilton arrived in Canada in the past 10 years (2011-2021), almost the same proportion as immigrants who came to Canada prior to 1980.
- Recent immigrants made up 14% of all immigrants, and were on a whole much younger than Hamilton's non-immigrant population.

Racialized Status:

- The proportion of racialized people has increased to 25.1% of Hamilton's population in 2021 compared to 19% in 2016.
- Among recent immigrants, almost 85% belonged to a racialized group, with South Asian being the top racialized group followed by Arab and Black.

Place of Origin and Ethnicity:

- United Kingdom was the top place of birth among all immigrants in Hamilton, but India is the top place of birth among recent immigrants. Other most common places of birth for recent immigrants were Syria, Philippines, Nigeria, and Iraq.
- Top ethnic origins reported by recent immigrants were Indian, Syrian, Filipino and Arab.

Employment, Income, and Education:

- Recent immigrants had a higher labour market participation rate compared to all immigrants and the total population in Hamilton, but also had a slightly higher unemployment rate.
- The top employment industries among all immigrants and recent immigrants in Hamilton were health care and social assistance, and manufacturing.

- Recent immigrants had lower average employment earnings (\$36,800) than all immigrants (\$44,720) and the total population (\$50,020). They were also more than twice as likely as non-immigrants to live in low-income situations (19.3% vs 9.3%).
- Among both immigrants and recent immigrants, generally women were more likely to live in low-income situations than men. Among those 25-64 years of age, almost 53% of recent immigrants had a university education, higher than immigrants (35.9%) and the total population (31%).

Linguistic Knowledge and Linguistic Groups:

- The most common mother tongue among all immigrants in Hamilton was English at 24.5%. Arabic and Italian were other common mother tongues.
- Among recent immigrants, Arabic, Tagalog, Spanish and Punjabi were most common non-official mother tongues and languages most often spoken at home.
- Among recent immigrants, over 9% did not have knowledge of English or French compared 1.8% of the total population.

Francophone immigration:

- The Francophone community makes up over 2% of Hamilton's population, but they make up a bigger proportion of recent immigrants (3.9%). Africa continues to be the top region of Francophone immigration to Hamilton.

Profil démographique des immigrants à Hamilton

À propos de ce rapport

Le présent et l'avenir de Hamilton continuent d'être façonnés par l'immigration. Les immigrants jouent un rôle clé dans la croissance de la population de Hamilton, contribuant à l'économie locale et enrichissant le tissu social et culturel de la ville. Entre 2016 et 2021, Hamilton a accueilli plus de 20 000 immigrants en plus d'un nombre croissant de résidents non permanents, notamment des étudiants étrangers, des travailleurs étrangers temporaires et des demandeurs d'asile.

Ce rapport présente les données du Recensement de la population de 2021 sur les immigrants à Hamilton, y compris les immigrants récents et ceux établis depuis plus longtemps. Son objectif est de mieux comprendre les populations immigrantes de Hamilton, y compris l'évolution de leurs caractéristiques au fil du temps et de comparer la ville de Hamilton au reste de la province et à d'autres villes de l'Ontario.

Dans ce rapport, « Hamilton » désigne la division de recensement de Hamilton, qui correspond à la région géographique englobée par la ville de Hamilton. La plupart des données présentées dans ce rapport sont tirées du Recensement de la population de 2021. Le rapport est né d'un projet dirigé par Sarah Wayland, gestionnaire principale de projet au *Hamilton Immigration Partnership Council* (HIPC) et Mohammad Araf, agent de programme au HIPC, et a bénéficié d'un soutien du comité d'évaluation de HIPC. À propos de HIPC

Le Hamilton Immigration Partnership Council (HIPC) est une table communautaire dont les membres travaillent ensemble pour s'assurer que les nouveaux arrivants vivent des expériences d'établissement réussies et ressentent un sentiment d'appartenance à Hamilton. Les membres de HIPC représentent, entre autres, des organismes d'aide à l'établissement, des établissements d'enseignement, le secteur privé, des services municipaux, des personnes ayant une expérience vécue de l'immigration. HIPC est financé par Immigration, Réfugiés et Citoyenneté Canada (IRCC) et fait partie de la division du développement économique de la Ville de Hamilton.

Résumé

Croissance démographique et prévisions :

- La population de Hamilton devrait dépasser les 800 000 habitants d'ici 2051, ce qui représente une augmentation d'environ 40 % de 2021 à 2051. Cette croissance est plus lente que celle prévue pour les villes de Halton et de Waterloo, mais plus rapide que celle de Niagara.

Données démographiques générales sur les immigrants :

- Près de trois Hamiltoniens sur 10 sont nés à l'extérieur du Canada. Près de 26 % de la population était constituée d'immigrants et 2,3 % de résidents non permanents.
- Parmi les immigrants récents (arrivés entre 2016 et 2021), 39 % étaient des immigrants économiques, 35 % des réfugiés et 24 % des immigrants parrainés.
- La migration en deux étapes a continué d'augmenter, puisque 34 % des immigrants récents à Hamilton étaient des étudiants étrangers, des travailleurs étrangers temporaires ou des demandeurs d'asile avant de devenir des résidents permanents.
- Environ le quart de la population immigrante de Hamilton est arrivée au Canada au cours des 10 dernières années (2011 à 2021), soit une proportion presque identique à celle des immigrants arrivés au Canada avant 1980.
- Les immigrants récents représentaient 14 % de tous les immigrants de Hamilton et étaient, dans l'ensemble, beaucoup plus jeunes que les non-immigrants.

Groupes racisés :

- La proportion de personnes racisées au sein de la population de Hamilton a augmenté, passant de 19 % en 2016 à 25,1 % en 2021.
- Parmi les immigrants récents, près de 85 % appartenaient à un groupe racisé, les Sud-Asiatiques étant le groupe racisé le plus important, suivis des Arabes et des Noirs.

Lieux d'origine et origines ethniques :

- Le Royaume-Uni était le principal lieu de naissance de tous les immigrants à Hamilton, mais l'Inde est le principal lieu de naissance des immigrants récents. Les autres lieux de naissance les plus courants des immigrants récents étaient la Syrie, les Philippines, le Nigéria et l'Iraq.
- Les principales origines ethniques déclarées par les immigrants récents étaient indiennes, syriennes, philippines et arabes.

Emploi, revenu et niveau de scolarité :

- Les immigrants récents avaient un taux d'activité sur le marché du travail plus élevé que l'ensemble des immigrants et de la population totale de Hamilton, mais également un taux de chômage légèrement plus élevé.
- Les principaux secteurs d'emploi de tous les immigrants et des immigrants récents à Hamilton étaient les soins de santé et l'aide sociale, ainsi que la fabrication.
- Les immigrants récents avaient des revenus d'emploi moyens inférieurs (36 800 \$) à ceux de l'ensemble des immigrants (44 720 \$) et de la population totale (50 020 \$). Ils étaient également plus de deux fois plus susceptibles que les non-immigrants de vivre dans une situation de faible revenu (19,3 % contre 9,3 %).

- Tant chez les immigrants que chez les immigrants récents, les femmes étaient généralement plus susceptibles de vivre dans une situation de faible revenu que les hommes. Dans le groupe d'âge de 25 à 64 ans, près de 53 % des immigrants récents avaient fait des études universitaires, contre 35,9 % pour les immigrants et 31 % pour l'ensemble de la population.

Connaissances linguistiques et groupes linguistiques :

- La langue maternelle la plus répandue chez tous les immigrants de Hamilton était l'anglais (24,5 %), l'arabe et l'italien étant d'autres langues maternelles courantes.
- Parmi les immigrants récents, l'arabe, le tagalog, l'espagnol et le pendjabi étaient les langues maternelles non officielles les plus courantes et les langues les plus souvent parlées à la maison.
- Parmi les immigrants récents, plus de 9 % ne connaissaient ni le français ni l'anglais, comparativement à 1,8 % de la population totale.

Immigration francophone :

- La communauté francophone représente plus de 2 % de la population de Hamilton, mais elle comprend une plus grande proportion d'immigrants récents (3,9 %). L'Afrique continue d'être la première région d'immigration francophone à Hamilton.

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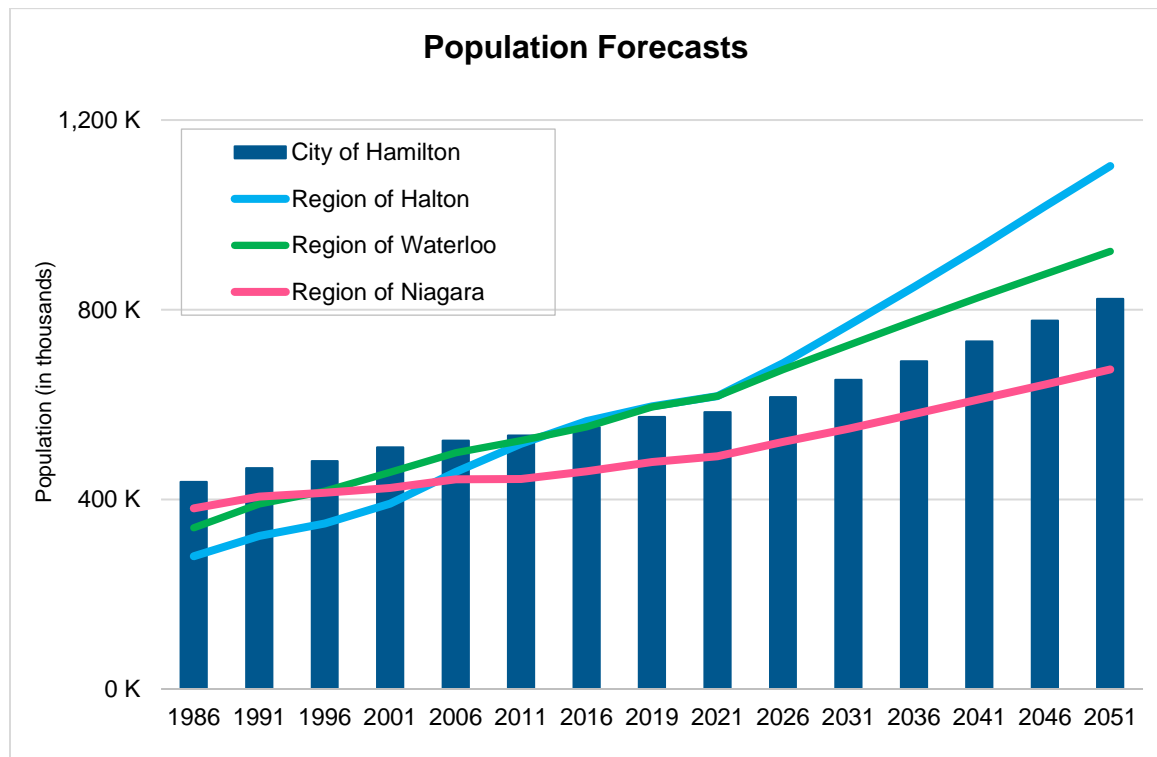
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Population Growth and Forecast

Population Forecast 2001-2021

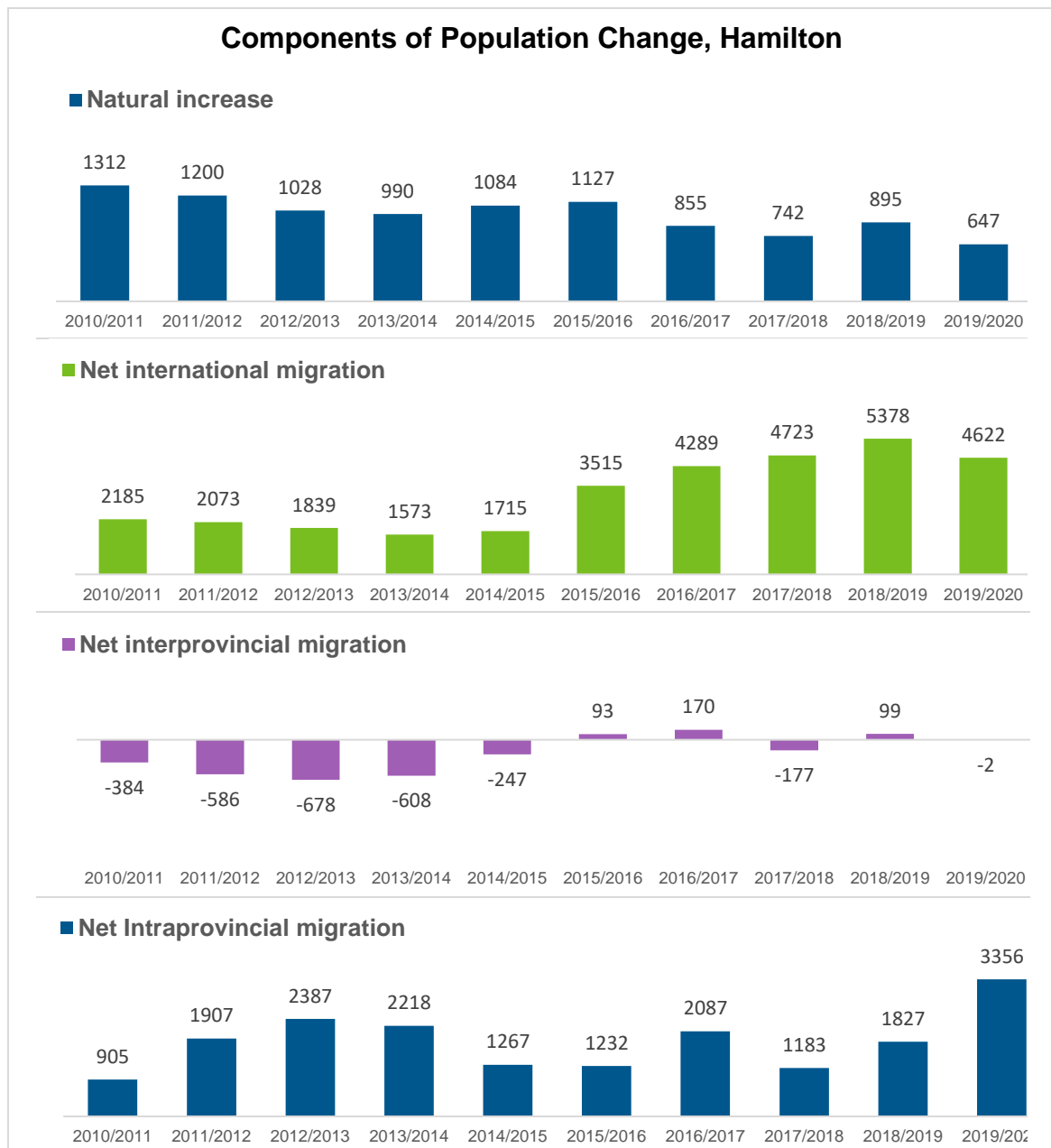
- Hamilton's population was 569,000 in 2021, and it is expected to surpass 800,000 by 2051, nearly 43% increase since 2021.
- Hamilton's population growth in the next three decades is projected to be higher than Region of Niagara but lower than Region of Waterloo and Region of Halton.

Factors of Population Growth

- Between 2010 and 2020, population growth caused by natural increases and inter-provincial migration declined in Hamilton. International migration, however, substantially increased as a component of population growth, especially since 2015.
- While intra-provincial migration fluctuated as a component of population growth in Hamilton from 2010-2020, it increased in 2019-2020 compared to the previous years.

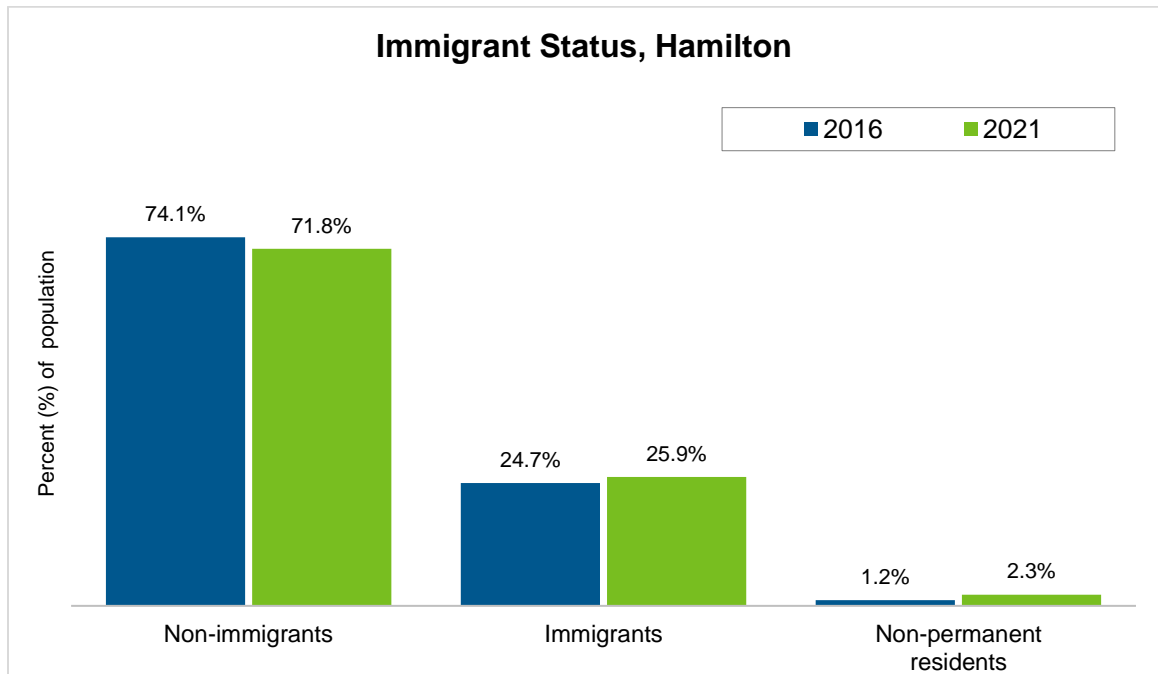

Immigrant Population

Immigrant Status, Hamilton

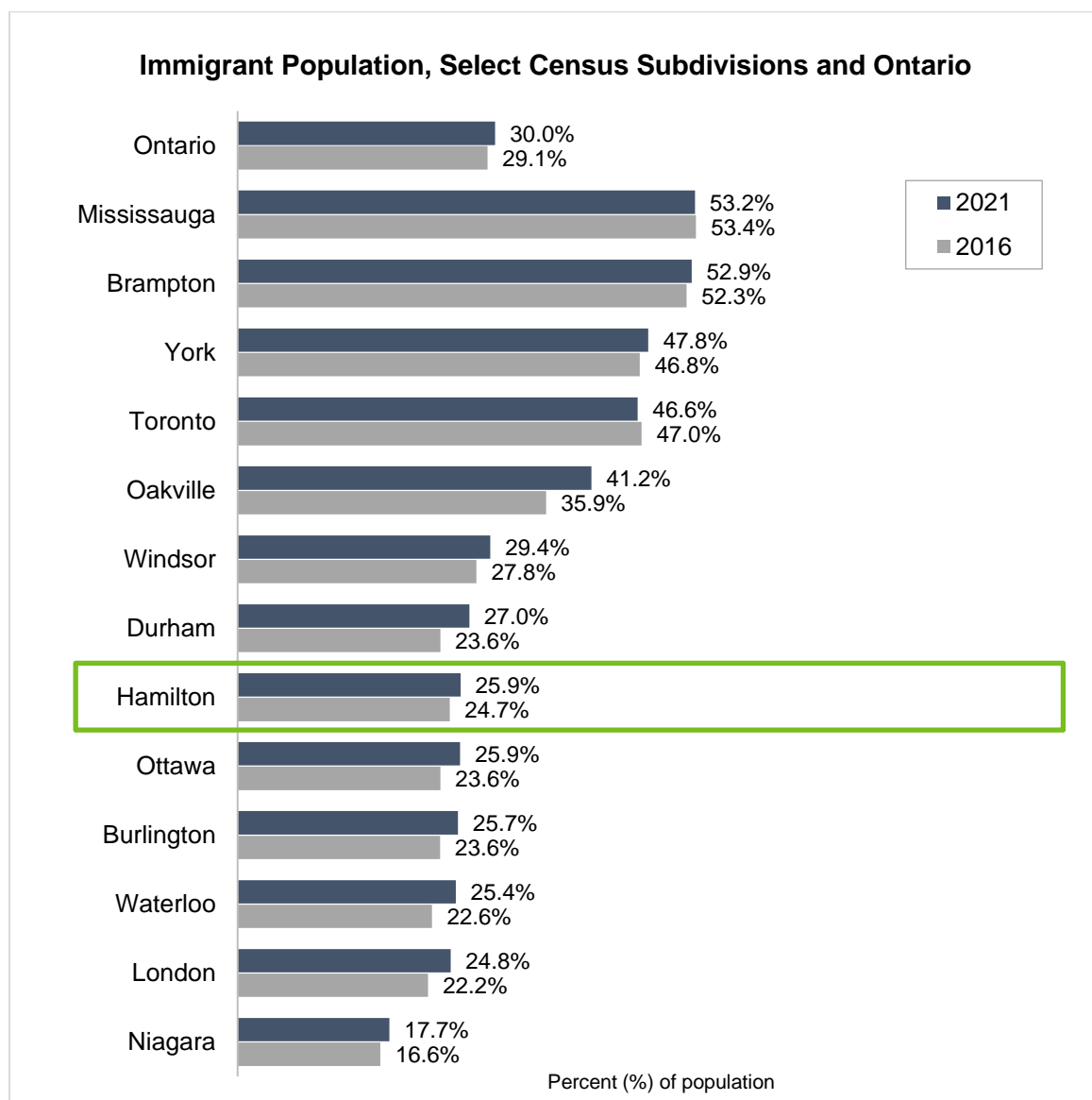
- In 2021, nearly three in 10 residents of Hamilton were born outside Canada and were either an immigrant or non-permanent resident.
- Non-permanent residents -- including international students, temporary foreign workers, and refugee claimants -- made up 2.3% of Hamilton's population in 2021. This proportion has almost doubled since 2016.
- Immigrants make up 25.9% of the population, up from 24.7% in 2016.

Immigrant Population in 2016 and 2021

- From 2016 to 2021, the proportion of immigrants in Hamilton's population increased by 1.2% -- from 24.7% to 25.9%. During the same period, Ontario's immigrant population grew by less than 1%.
- As a proportion of total population, the immigrant population remained almost unchanged in Toronto, Mississauga, and Brampton. Other Ontario municipalities each saw at least 1% increases.
- Oakville saw the largest proportional increase at 5.3%, followed by Durham at 3.5%, and London at 3.1%.

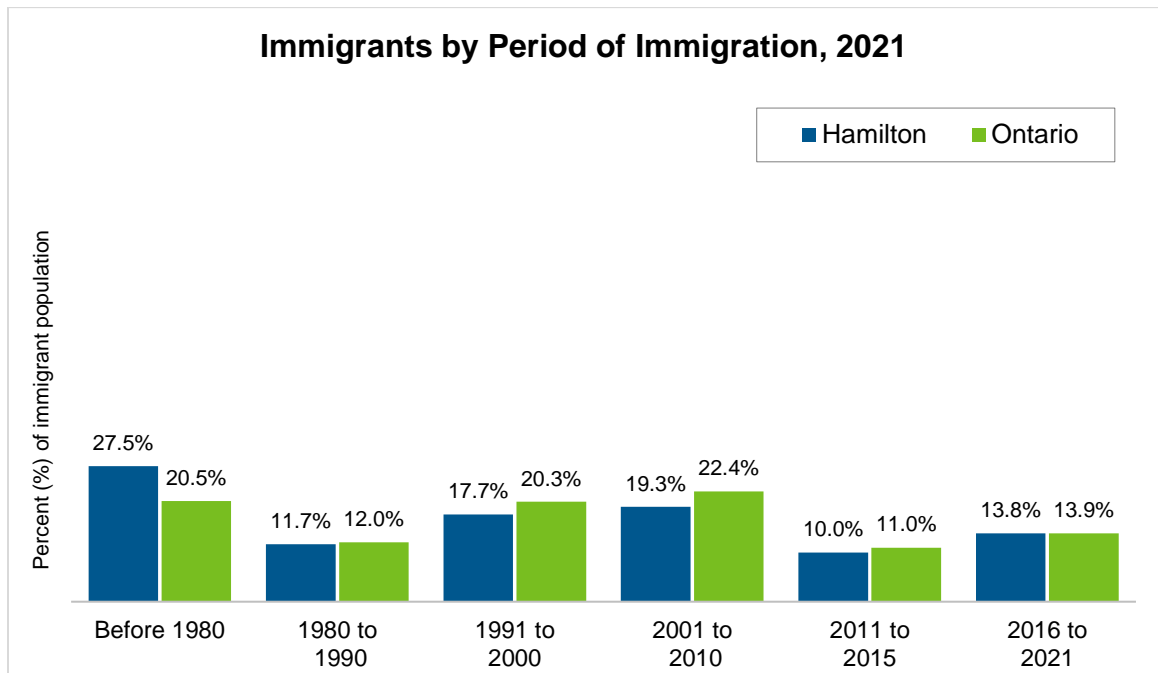

Immigrant Status and Period of Immigration

Immigrants by Period of Immigration

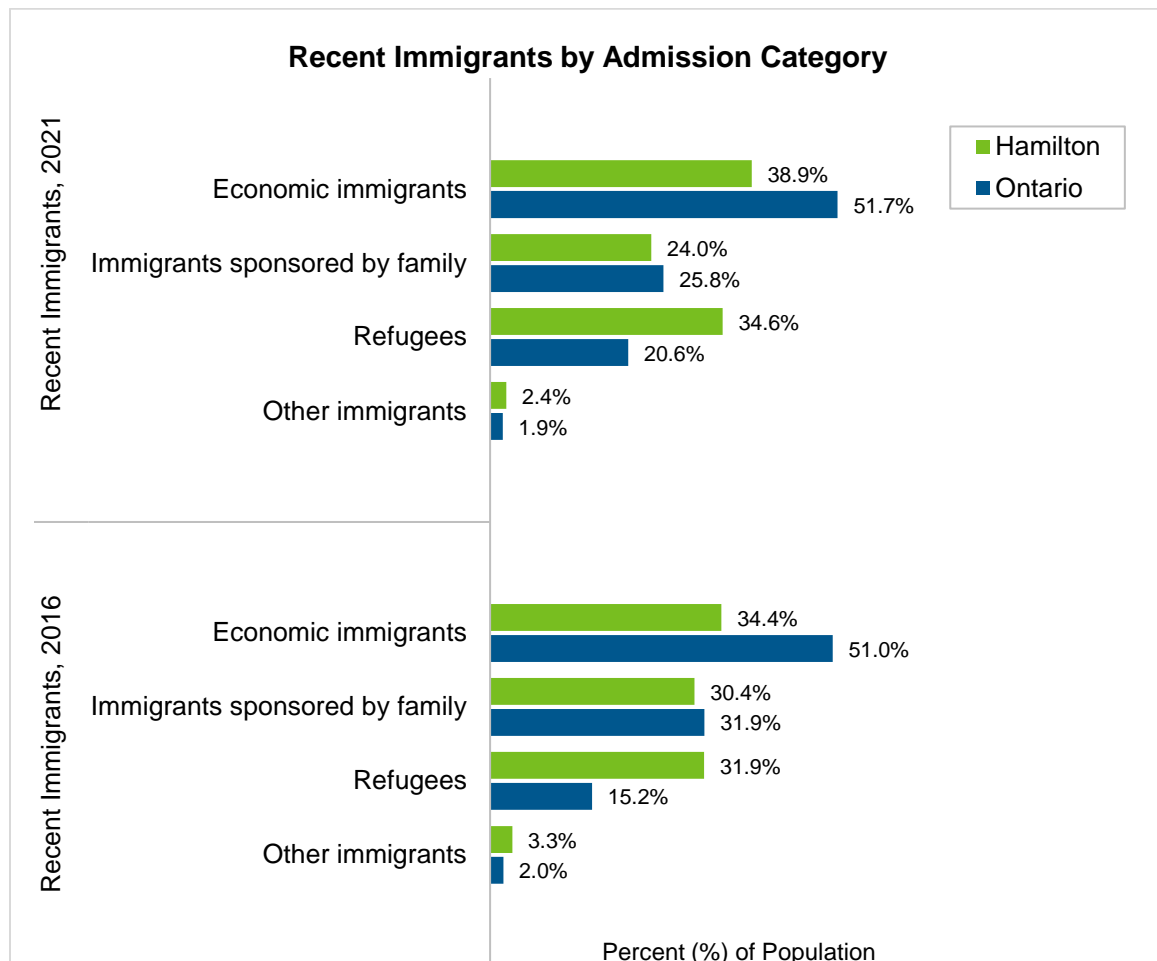
- More than one in four immigrants in Hamilton arrived before 1980. Hamilton has a larger proportion of immigrants who immigrated before 1980 than that of Ontario.
- However, similar to Ontario as a whole, almost 14% of immigrants in Hamilton arrived between 2016 and 2021.

Immigrants Admission Category

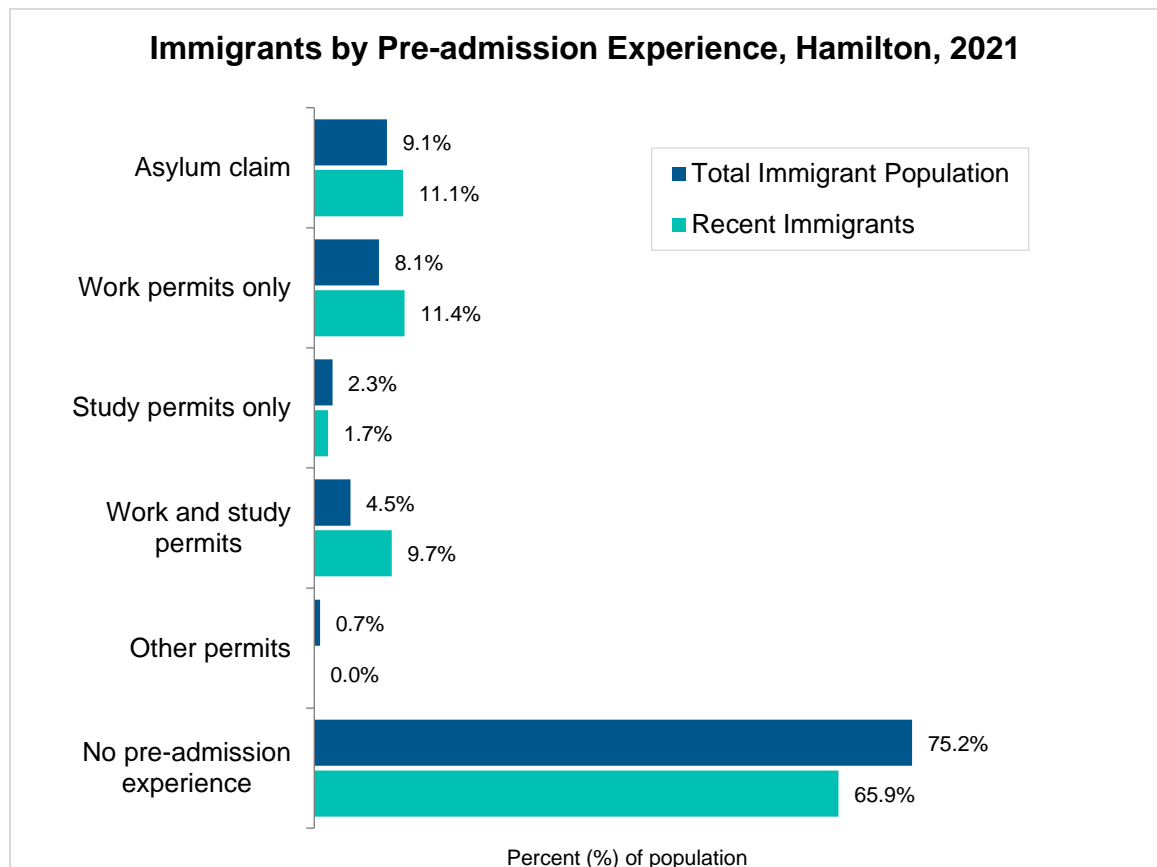
- In 2021, recent immigrants living in Hamilton were more likely to have arrived as economic immigrants than any other admission category.
- About one-third of recent immigrants in Hamilton were admitted as refugees.
- Compared to Ontario's recent immigrants, Hamilton's recent immigrant population had a higher proportion of refugees and a lower proportion of economic class immigrants in 2021.
- Since 2016, there has been an increase in the proportion of economic immigrants (from 34.4% to 38.9%) and a decrease in family class immigrants (from 30.4% to 24.0%) among the recent immigrant population in Hamilton.

Immigrants' Pre-Admission Experience, Hamilton

- Many immigrants in Hamilton have lived in Canada as international students, temporary foreign workers or asylum seekers prior to becoming permanent residents (known as pre-admission experience).
- In Hamilton in 2021, one-fourth of all immigrants and over one-third of recent immigrants, defined as those individuals who immigrated between 2016-2021 had pre-admission experience.

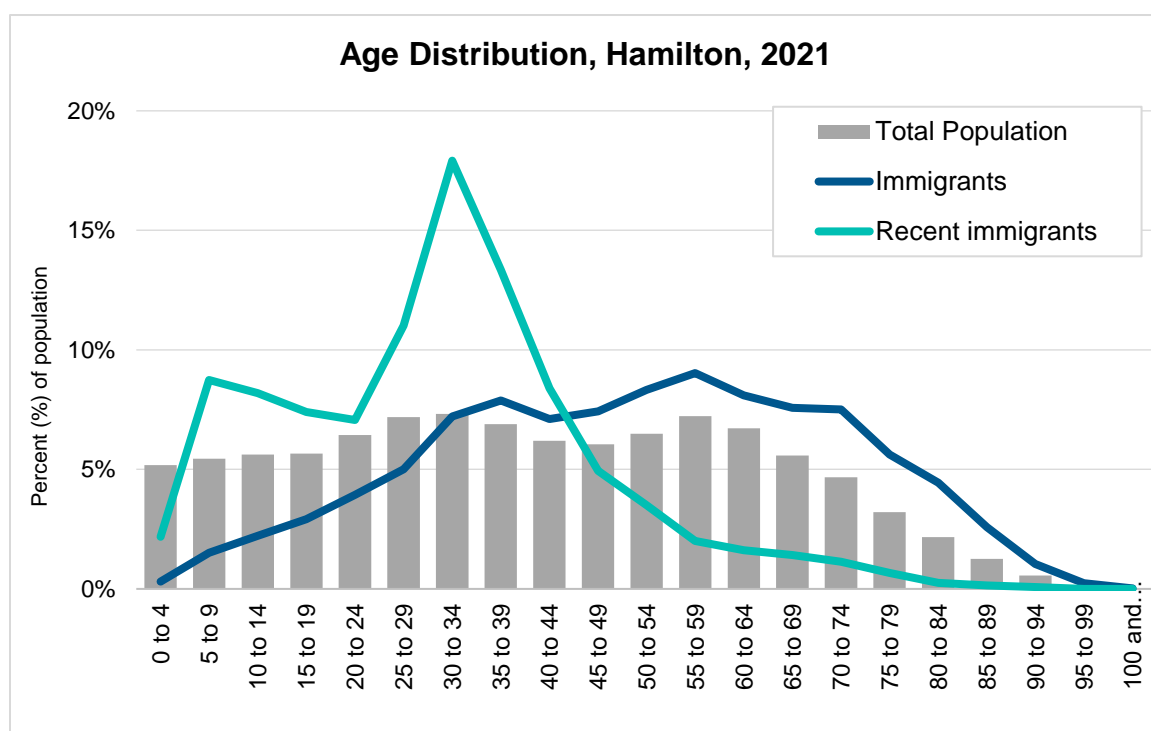

Age and Gender Distribution

Age Distribution, Hamilton, 2021

- Recent immigrants in Hamilton are generally younger compared to the overall population and all immigrants.
- Just over half of recent immigrants in Hamilton (50.7%) are between the ages of 25 and 44, nearly twice the proportion of this age group among all immigrants in Hamilton and among the city's total population.
- These figures do not vary much by gender.

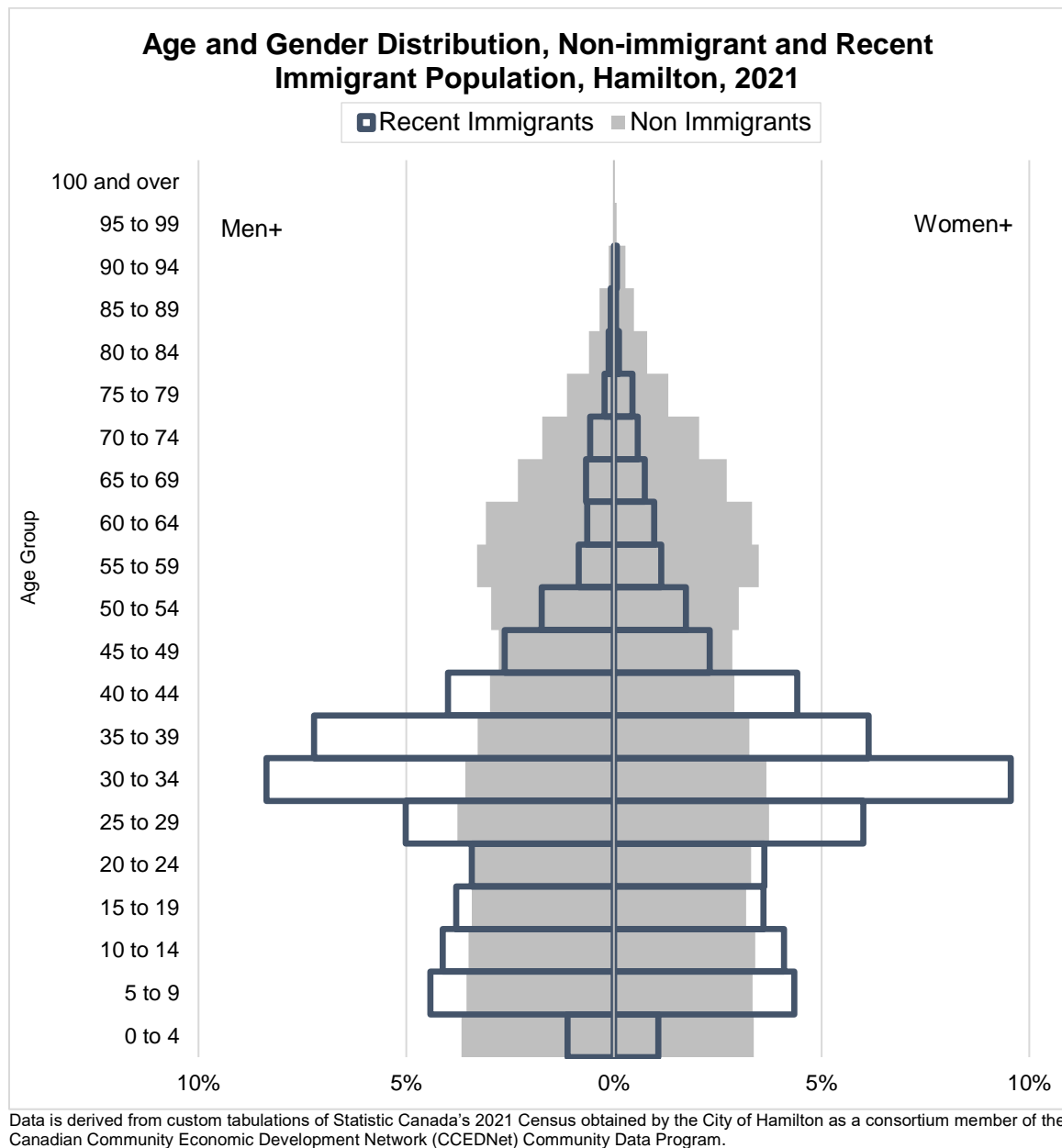

Age & Gender Distribution of Non-Immigrants and Recent Immigrants

- Recent immigrants were, as a whole, much younger than non-immigrants across both genders.
- The largest age cohorts among recent immigrants were aged 30 to 34, 35 to 39, and 25 to 29, with more women than men represented across these groups.
- There was a higher proportion of school-aged children between the ages of 5 to 19 years, among recent immigrants compared to the non-immigrant population.

- Overall, there were more recent immigrants identifying as women+1 than men+2.
- Data on sexual orientation was not collected in 2021.

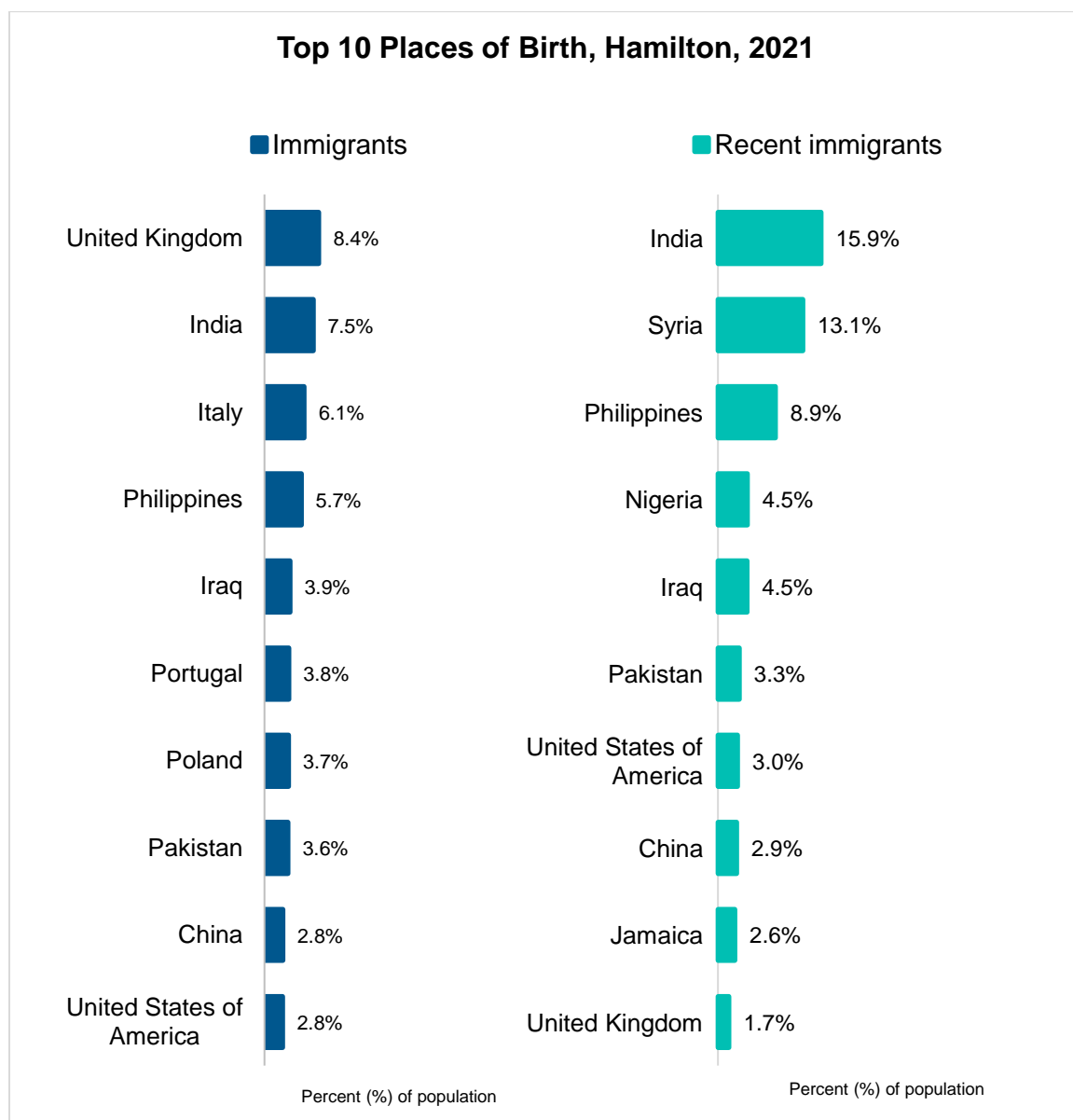


^{1&2} In Census 2021, Statistics Canada introduced the concept of gender. Gender refers to an individual's personal and social identity as a man, woman or non-binary person (a person who is not exclusively a man or a woman). Given that the non-binary population is small, data aggregation to a two-category gender variable was necessary to protect the confidentiality of responses provided. In these cases, individuals in the category "non-binary persons" are distributed into the other two gender categories and are denoted by the "+" symbol.

Place of Birth

Top 10 Places of Birth, Immigrants and Recent Immigrants

- In 2021, United Kingdom, India, and Italy were the top places of birth for immigrants in Hamilton.
- India was the top country of birth among recent immigrants in Hamilton in 2021. Syria is the second most common place of birth, followed by Philippines, Nigeria, and Iraq.

Mother Tongues

Top 10 Mother Tongues for Immigrants, Hamilton and Ontario

- In 2021, English was by far the most common mother tongue³ for immigrants in Hamilton and overall in Ontario.
- Other common mother tongues for immigrants in Hamilton were Arabic, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, and Tagalog.
- Other common mother tongues for immigrants in Ontario were Mandarin, Cantonese, Arabic and Punjabi.

Top 10 Mother Tongues for Recent Immigrants, Hamilton and Ontario, 2021

- In Hamilton, Arabic was the top mother tongue among recent immigrants (persons landing between 2016 and 2021). In Ontario, Arabic was second to English as the top mother tongue spoken by recent immigrants.
- Other common mother tongues among recent immigrants in Hamilton were English, Tagalog, Spanish, Punjabi, Gujarati, Hindi, Mandarin, and Urdu.

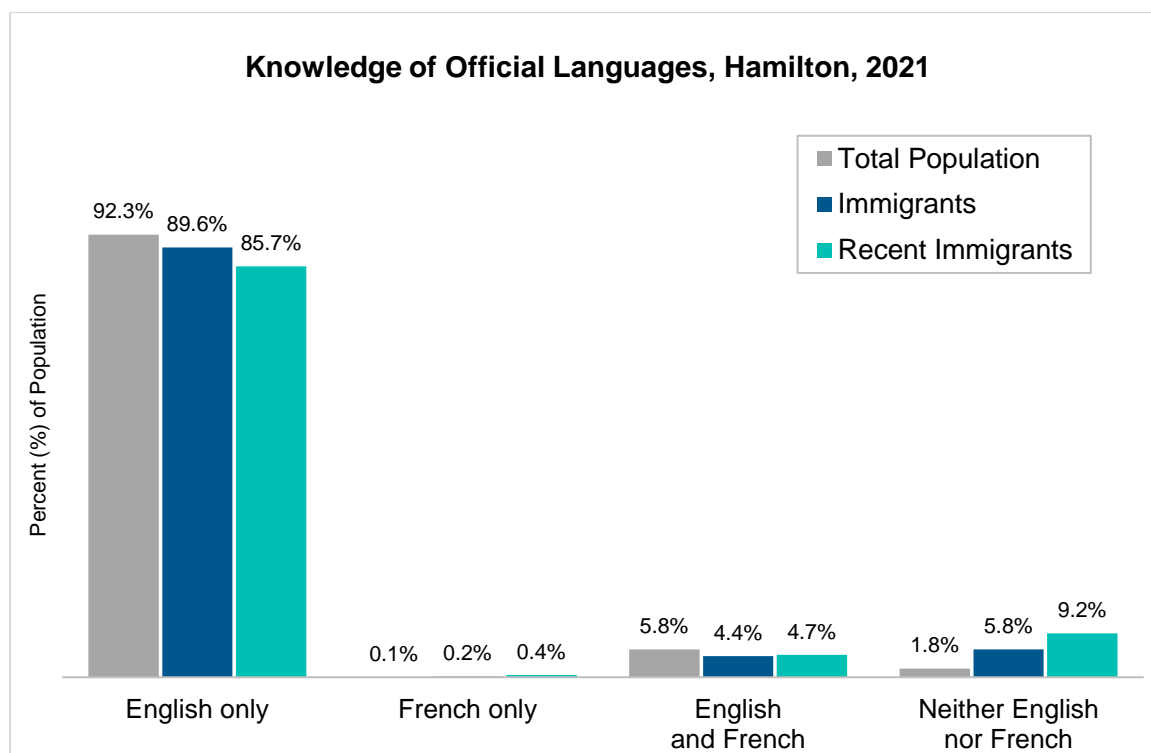

Knowledge of Official Languages

Knowledge of Official Languages, Hamilton

- Within Hamilton's general population, 98.1% reported having knowledge of English, which includes almost 6% with knowledge of English and French.
- Among recent immigrants, 90.4% had knowledge of English, which includes 4.7% with knowledge of both English and French. Less than 10% of recent immigrants in Hamilton did not know English or French.

Languages Spoken Most Often at Home

Top 10 Languages Spoken Most Often at Home by Immigrants

- In 2021, English was the most common language spoken most often at home by the immigrant population in Hamilton and Ontario. There was a slightly higher percentage of immigrants in Hamilton reporting English as the most often spoken language at home than in Ontario (52.0% vs. 47.2%).
- Other languages most often spoken at home by immigrants in Hamilton were Arabic, Spanish, Italian, Punjabi, and Tagalog.
- In Ontario, other common languages spoken most often at home by immigrants were Mandarin, Cantonese, Punjabi, Arabic and Tagalog.

Top 10 Languages Spoken Most Often at Home by Recent Immigrants

- In 2021, the top language spoken most often at home by recent immigrants in both Hamilton and Ontario was English.
- Other languages most often spoken at home by recent immigrants in Hamilton were Arabic, Tagalog, Punjabi, Spanish Gujarati, and Mandarin. Among recent immigrants in Ontario, other languages most often spoken at home included Arabic, Mandarin, Punjabi, Tagalog, Hindi, and Urdu.

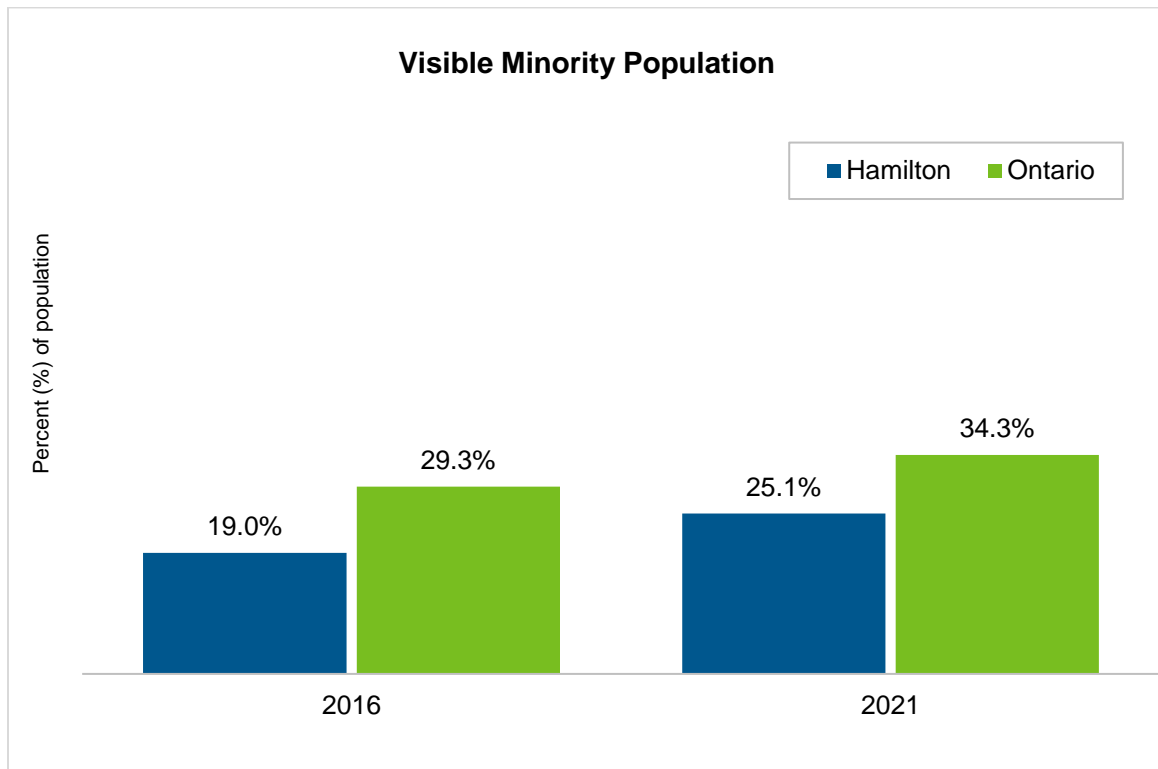

Racialized Population, Hamilton and Ontario, 2016 and 2021

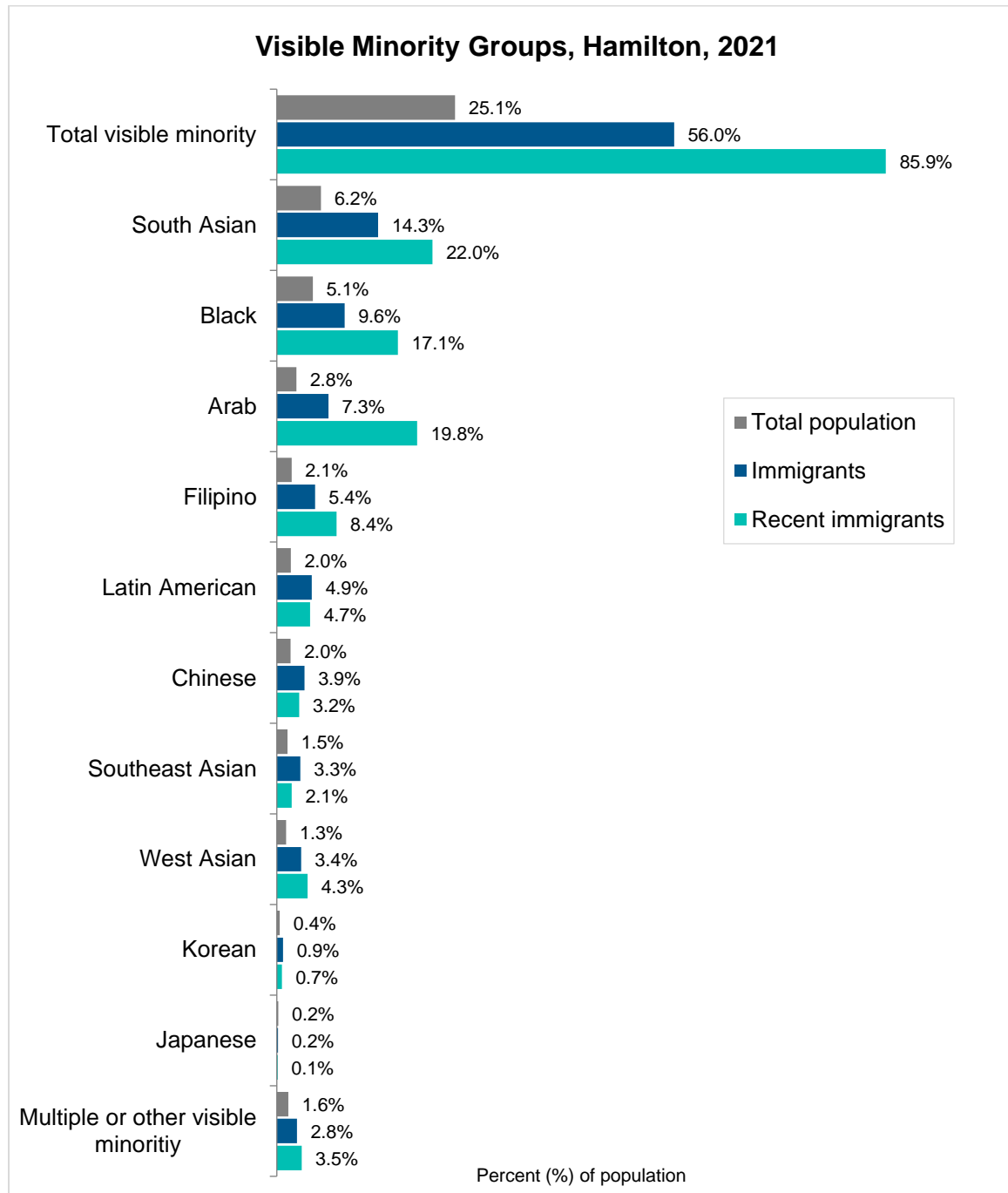
- From 2016 to 2021, the proportion of persons reporting a racialized identity has increased in both Hamilton and Ontario.
- In 2021, 25.1% of the Hamilton population identified as racialized, compared to 19% in 2016 (6.1% increase).

Racialized Groups, Hamilton, 2021

- In 2021, 85.9% of recent immigrants belonged to a racialized group, compared to 56% of all immigrants and 25.1% of the total Hamilton population.
- Among recent immigrants in Hamilton, the top racialized groups were South Asian (22%), Arab (19.8%), Black (17.1%) and Filipino (8.4%).

Top 10 Ethnic Origins of Immigrants

- In 2021, the top ethnic origins among immigrants in Hamilton were Indian (India) and Italian. Other common ethnic origins were Filipino, Chinese, Polish, English, and Portuguese.
- In Ontario, Chinese is the top ethnic origin reported by immigrants, followed by Indian (India), Filipino, Italian, Pakistani, and English.

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Top 10 Ethnic Origins of Recent Immigrants

- In 2021, the top ethnic origin among recent immigrants in Hamilton was Indian (India), followed by Syrian, Filipino, Arab, Chinese, and African.
- Among recent immigrants in Ontario, Indian (India) also tops the list of ethnic origins reported, followed by Chinese, Filipino, and Arab.

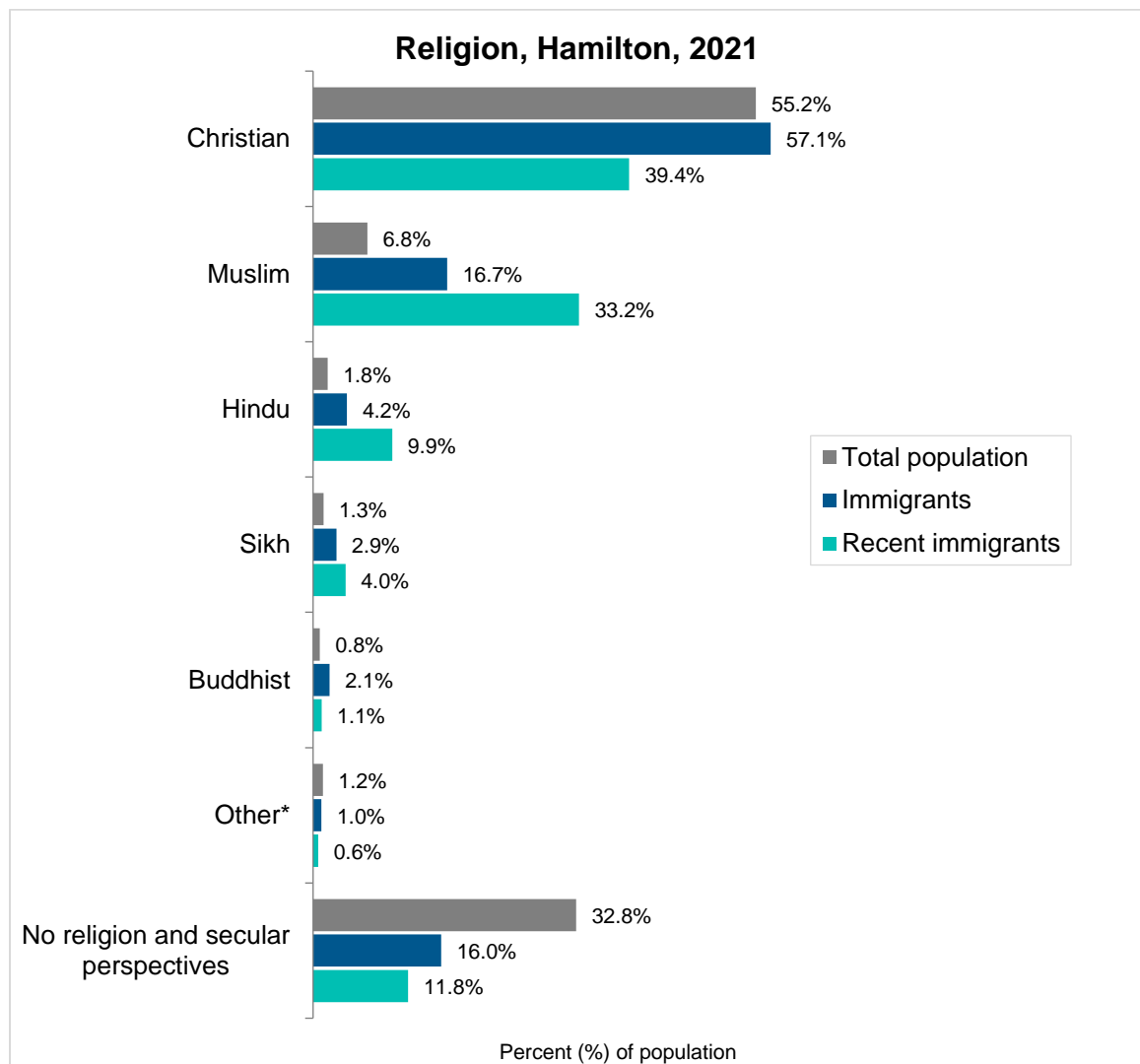

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Religion

Faith Communities in Hamilton

- In 2021, 57.1% of immigrants in Hamilton identified as Christian and 16.7% as Muslim.
- Among recent immigrants, 39.4% were Christian, 33.2% Muslim, 9.9% Hindu and 4.0% as Sikh.
- In Hamilton, the proportion of the population that reported “no religion or secular perspectives” was much lower among immigrants (16.0%) and recent immigrants (11.8%) when compared to the total population (32.8%).



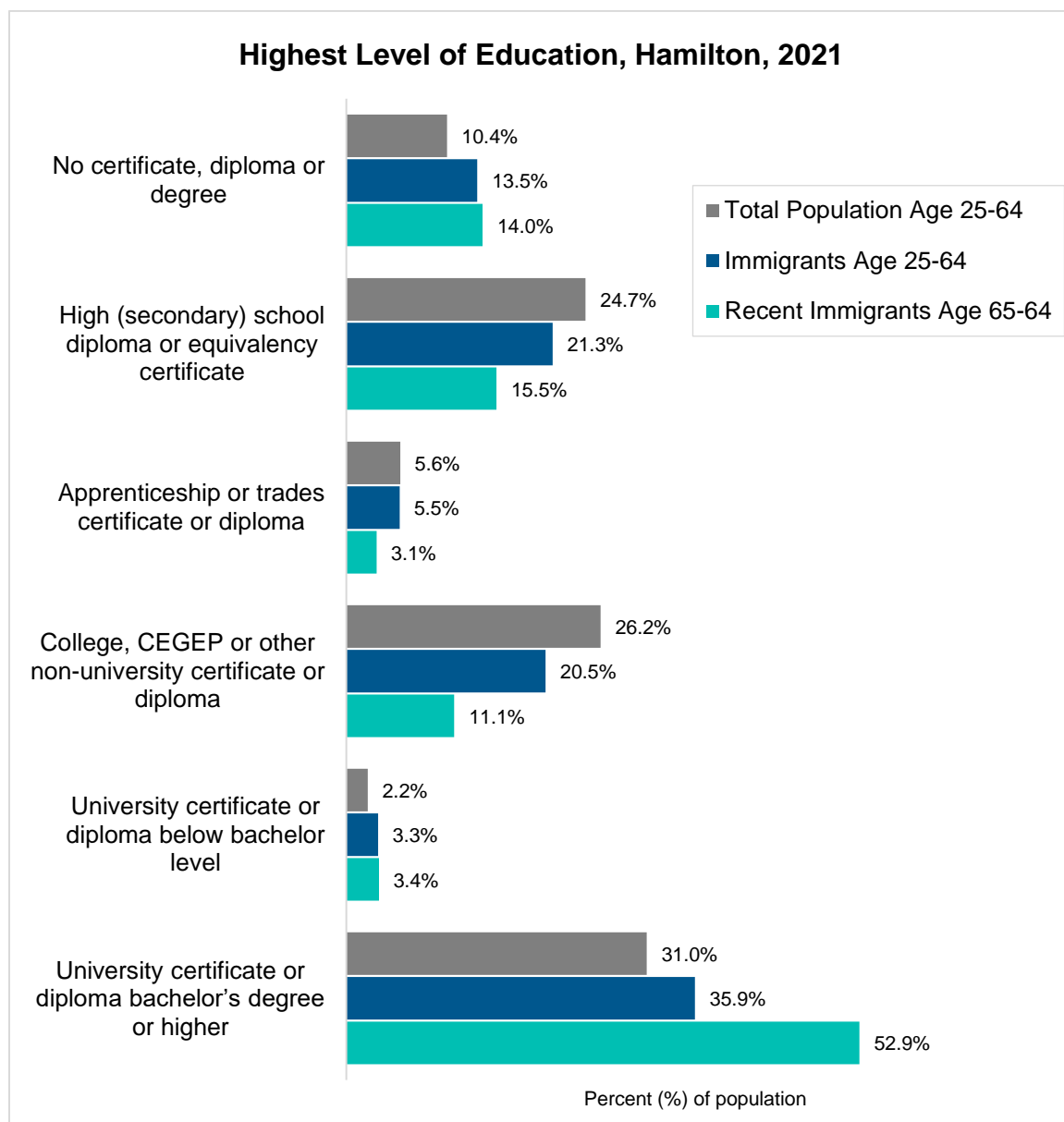

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Education

Highest Level of Education

- In 2021, the proportion of Hamilton residents aged 25 to 64 with a university education was substantially higher among recent immigrants (52.9%) than among immigrants (35.9%) and the overall population (31%).
- The proportion of population that did not have a certificate, diploma or degree was slightly higher among recent immigrants (14%) than among immigrants (13.5%) and the overall population (10.4%).

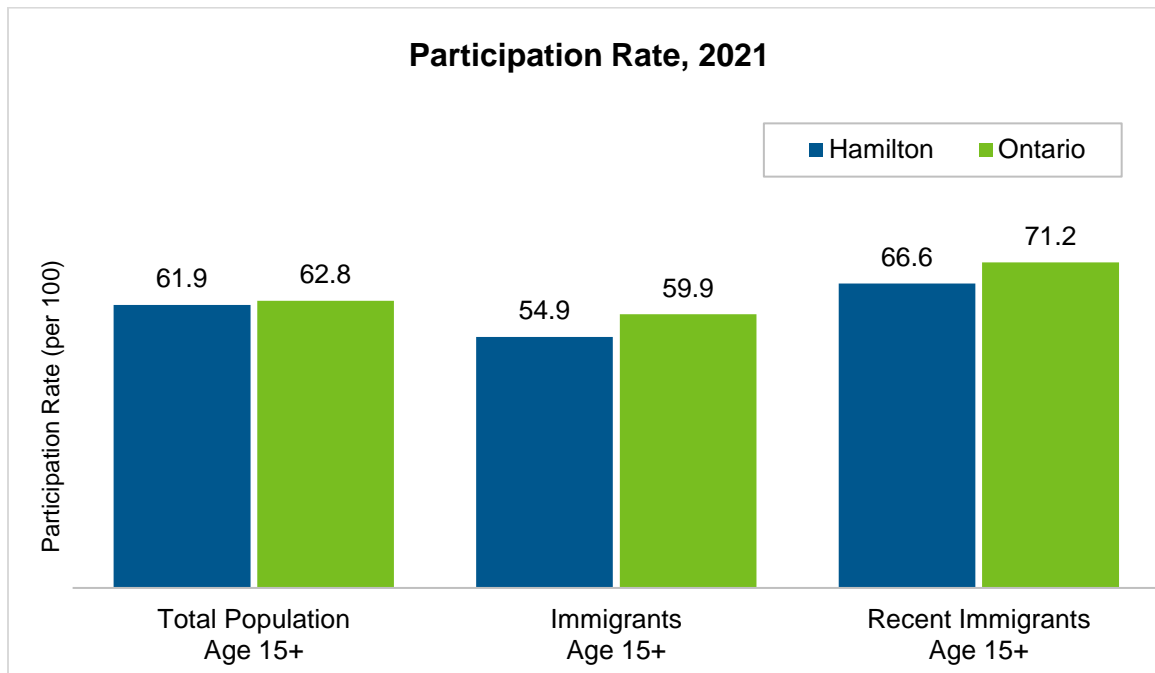

Employment

Labour Market Participation Rate

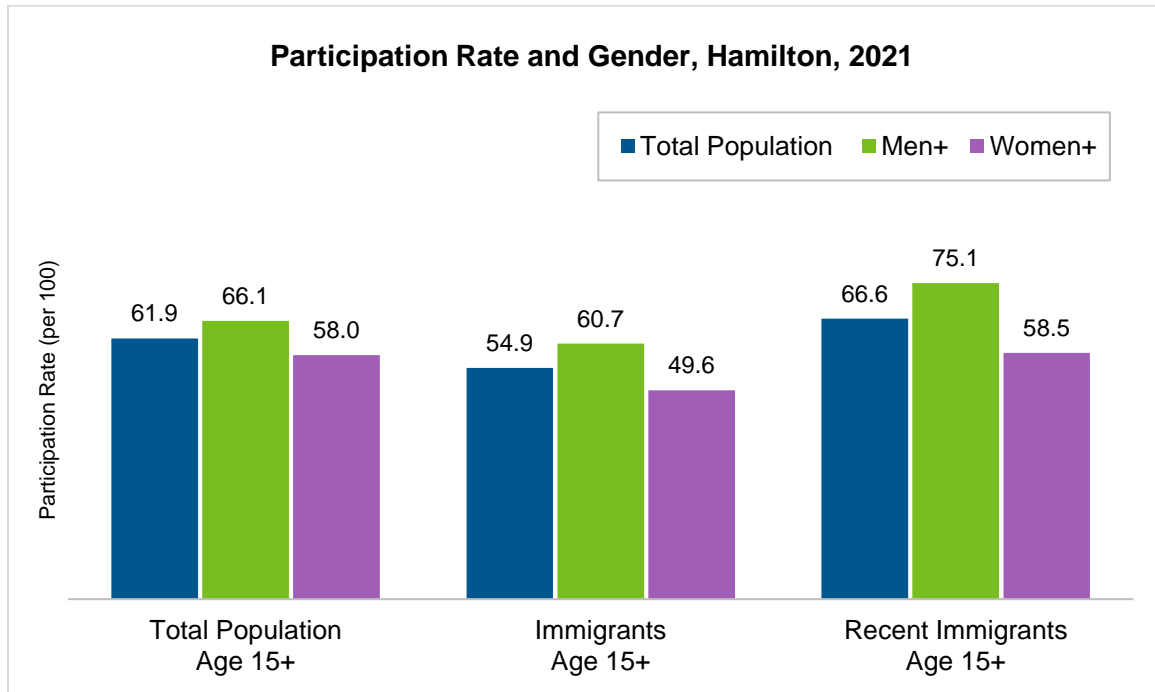
- In Hamilton, the labour market participation rate was higher among recent immigrants (66.6%) compared to all immigrants (54.9%) and the total Hamilton population (61.9%), but lower compared to Ontario's rate (71.2%).

Labour Market Participation Rate by Gender

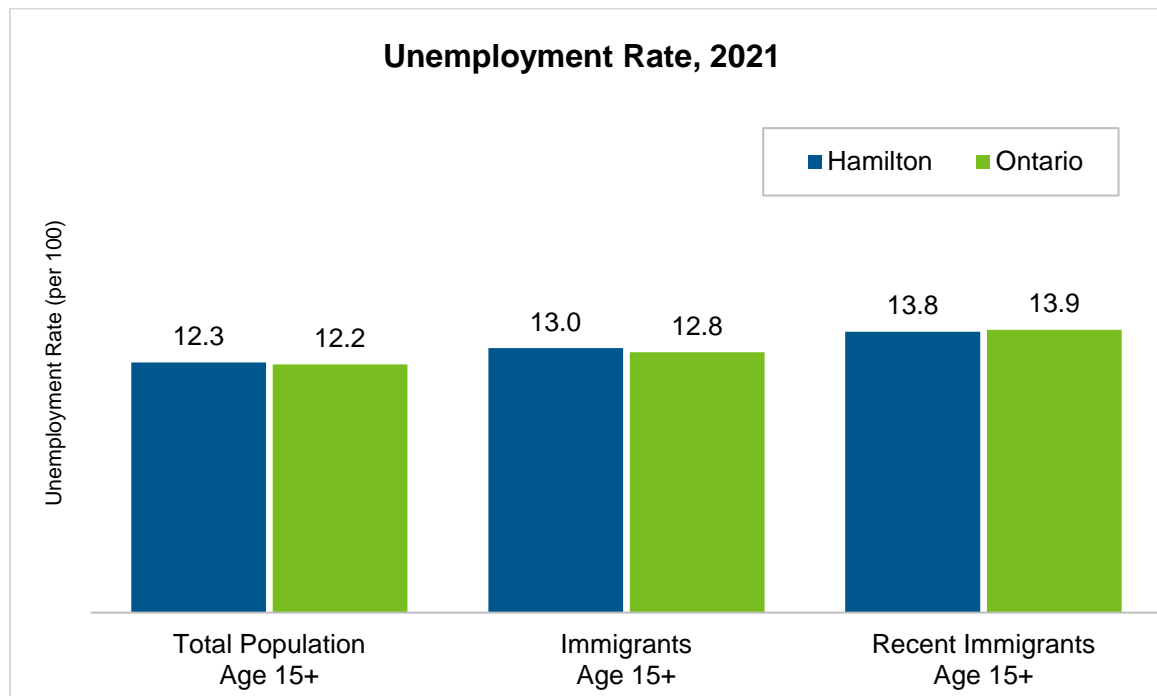
- Labour market participation rates are generally lower among women compared to men, but the gender gap was more substantial among immigrants and recent immigrants.



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Unemployment Rates

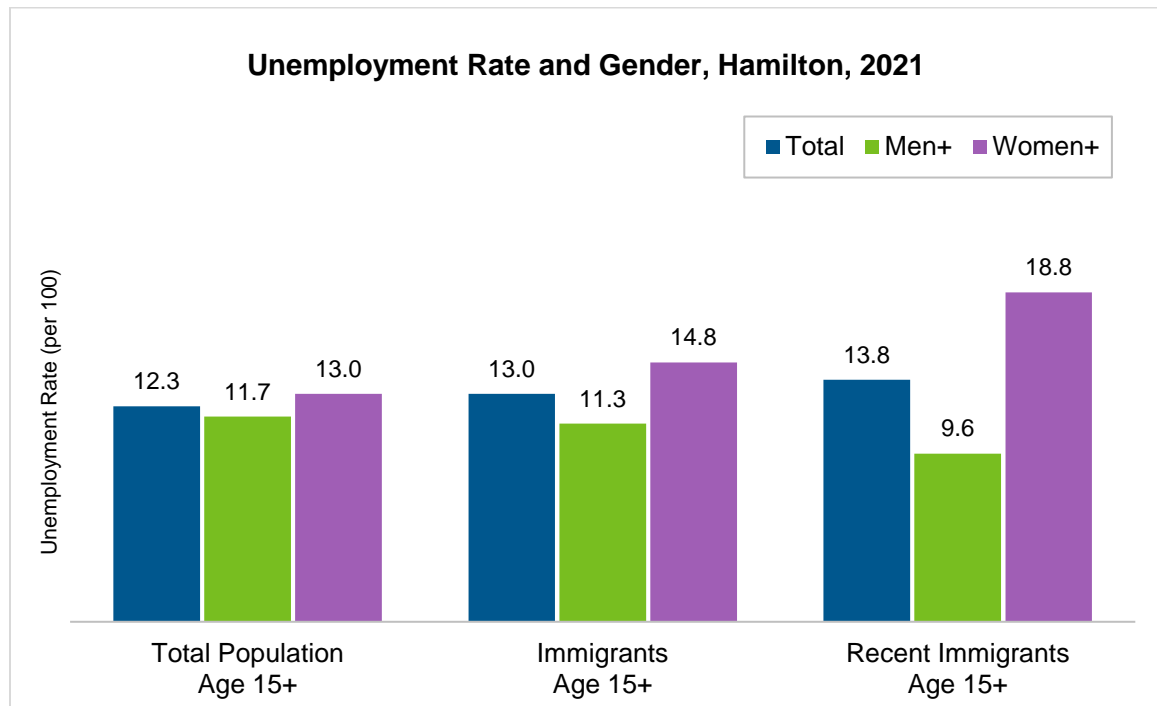
- In Hamilton, unemployment rates were just slightly higher among recent immigrants in Hamilton compared to those of all immigrants and the total population.
- Unemployment rates among immigrants and recent immigrants in Hamilton are similar to Ontario rates.
- It is worth noting that the COVID-19 pandemic caused labour market disruptions in 2020 and 2021. In 2016, the unemployment rate among the total population in Hamilton was 7%, much lower than 12.3% in 2021.



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Unemployment Rates by Gender

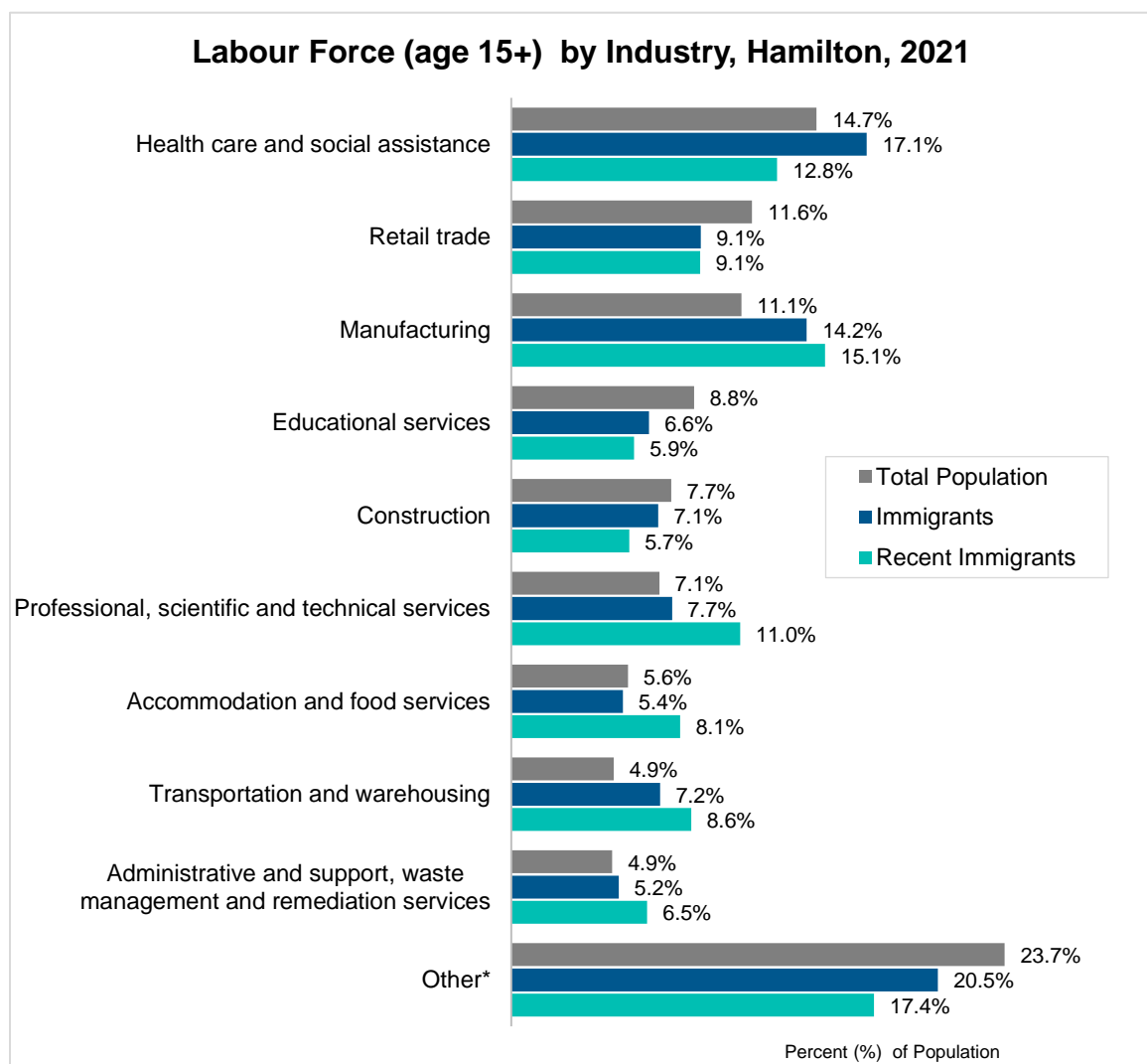
- In general, women had higher unemployment rates than men. The gender gap was more significant among the immigrant and recent immigrant groups.
- Among recent immigrants, women were twice as likely as men to be unemployed.



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Labour Force by Industry

- The top employment industries among all immigrants in Hamilton were 1) health care and social assistance, and 2) manufacturing. Among recent immigrants, top employment industries were 1) manufacturing, 2) healthcare and social assistance, and 3) professional, scientific, and technical services.
- A smaller proportion of recent immigrants were in healthcare and social assistance, educational services, and construction than all immigrants and the total Hamilton population. A higher percentage of recent immigrants were employed in 1) professional, scientific and technical services, 2) accommodation and food services and 3) transportation and warehousing, compared to all immigrants and the total Hamilton population.

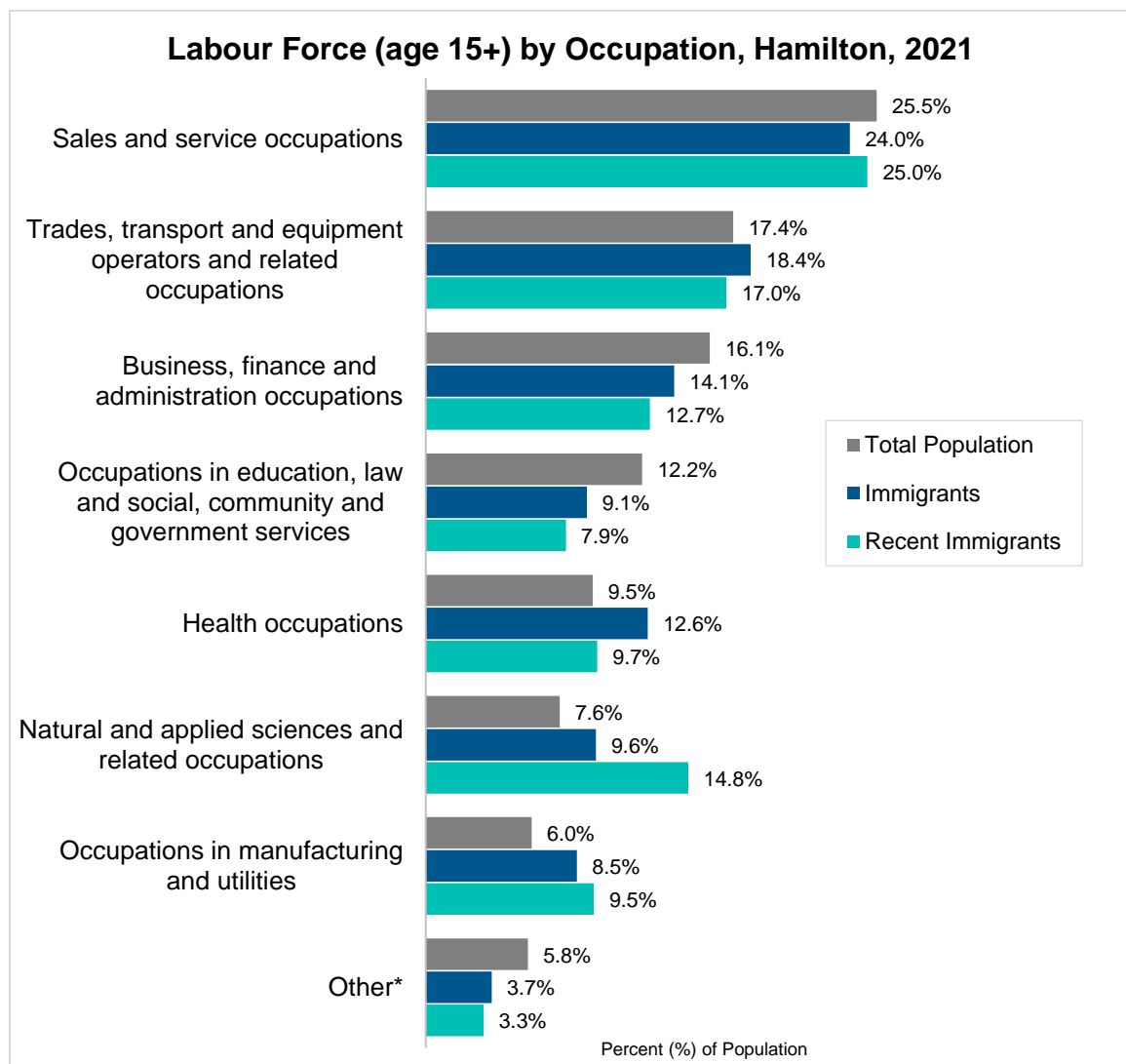

- The top occupations immigrants and recent immigrants were employed in were 1) sales and service occupations and trades, and 2) transport and equipment operators and related occupations.
- A smaller proportion of recent immigrants were in business, finance and administration occupations and occupations in education, law, social community, and government services compared to all immigrants and the overall Hamilton population.
- A larger proportion of recent immigrants were in natural and applied sciences and related occupations, and in occupations in manufacturing and utilities.



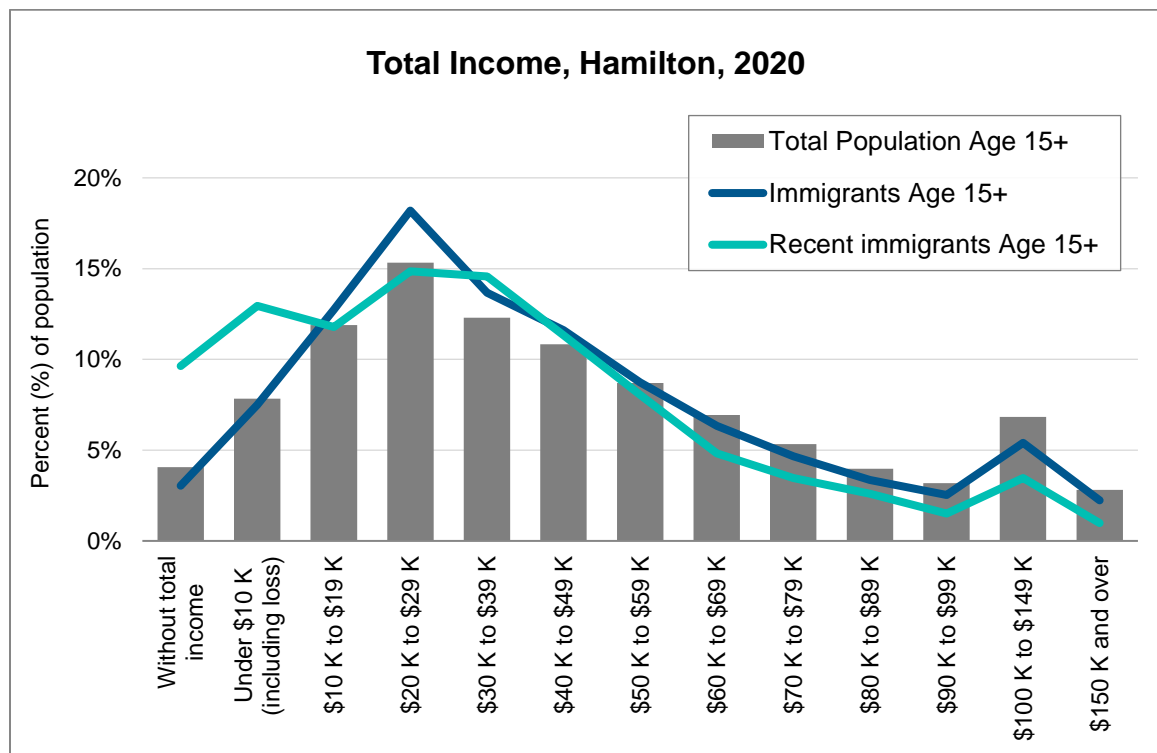

Total Income Categories

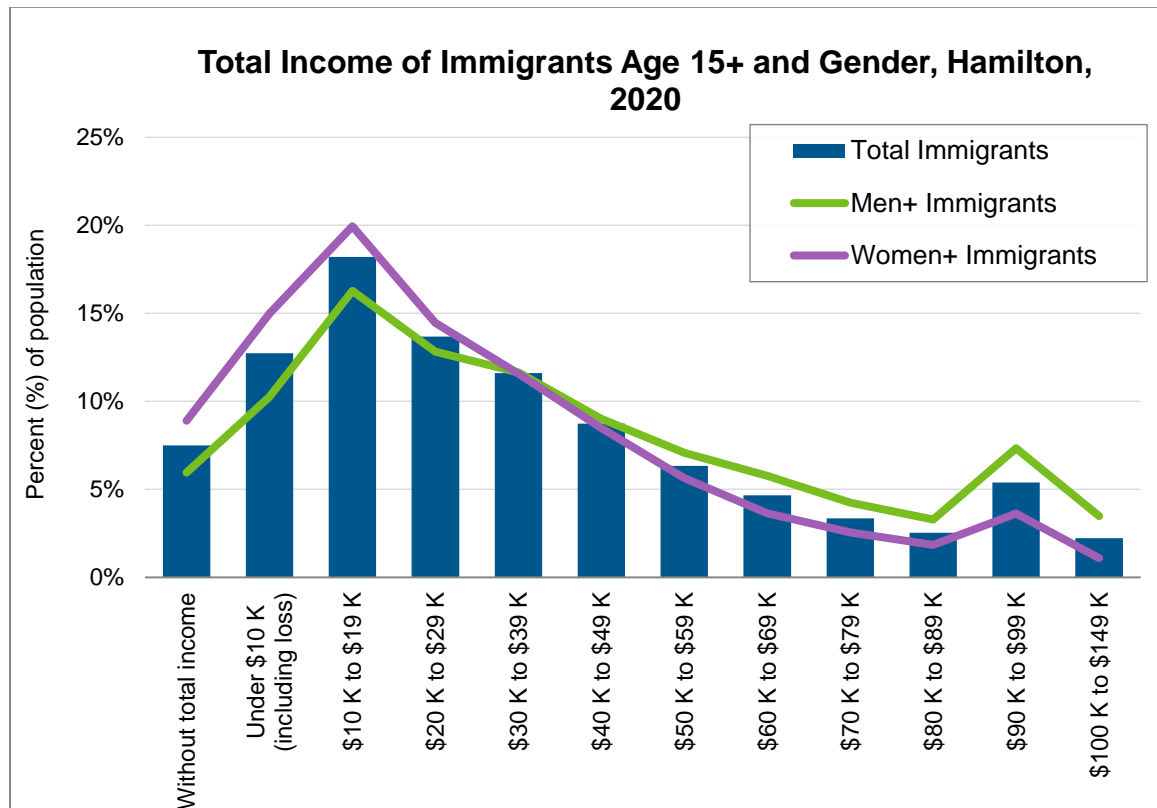
- Overall, recent immigrants had lower total income compared to the total and immigrant population.
- Over 12.9% of recent immigrants had total income under \$10,000 which is a much higher proportion than 7.5% for immigrants and 7.8% for the total population.
- Generally, a smaller proportion of recent immigrants had incomes higher than \$40,000 compared to all immigrants and the total Hamilton population.

Total Income of Immigrants by Gender

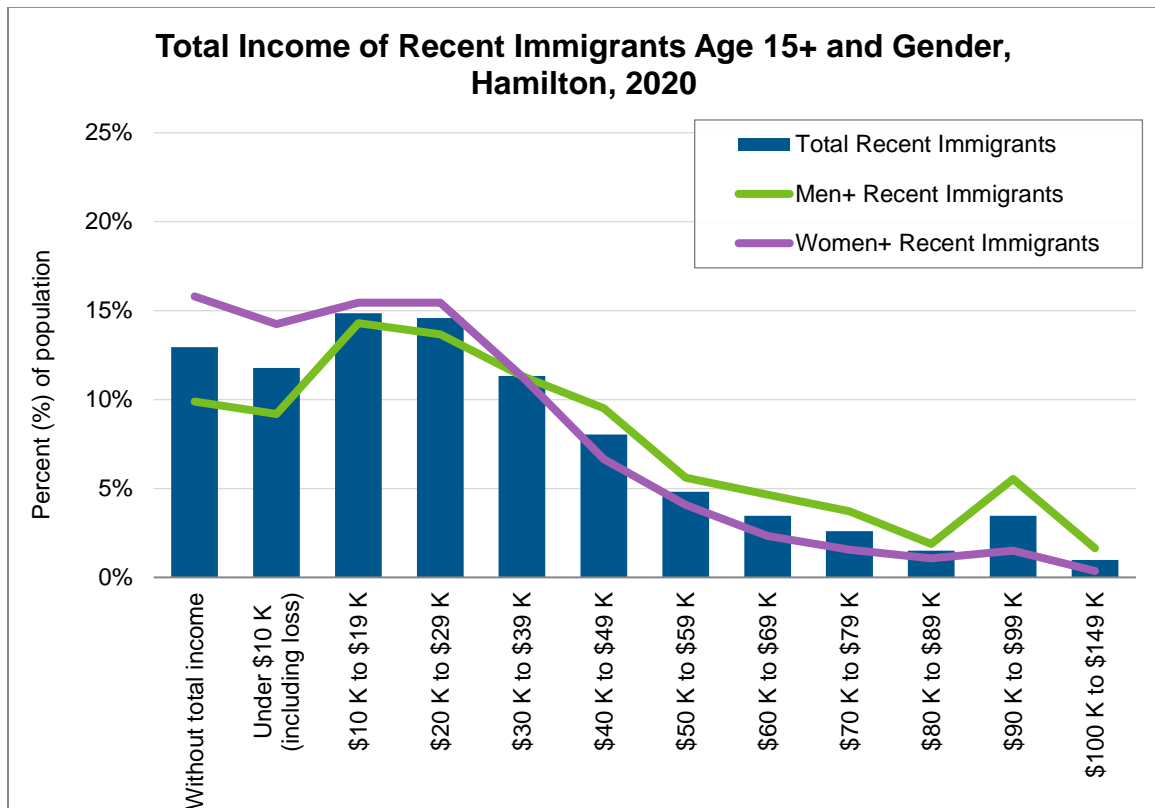
- Compared to men, immigrant women were more likely to have lower incomes (less than \$20,000) and less likely to have higher incomes (over \$40,000).



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Total Income of Recent Immigrants by Gender

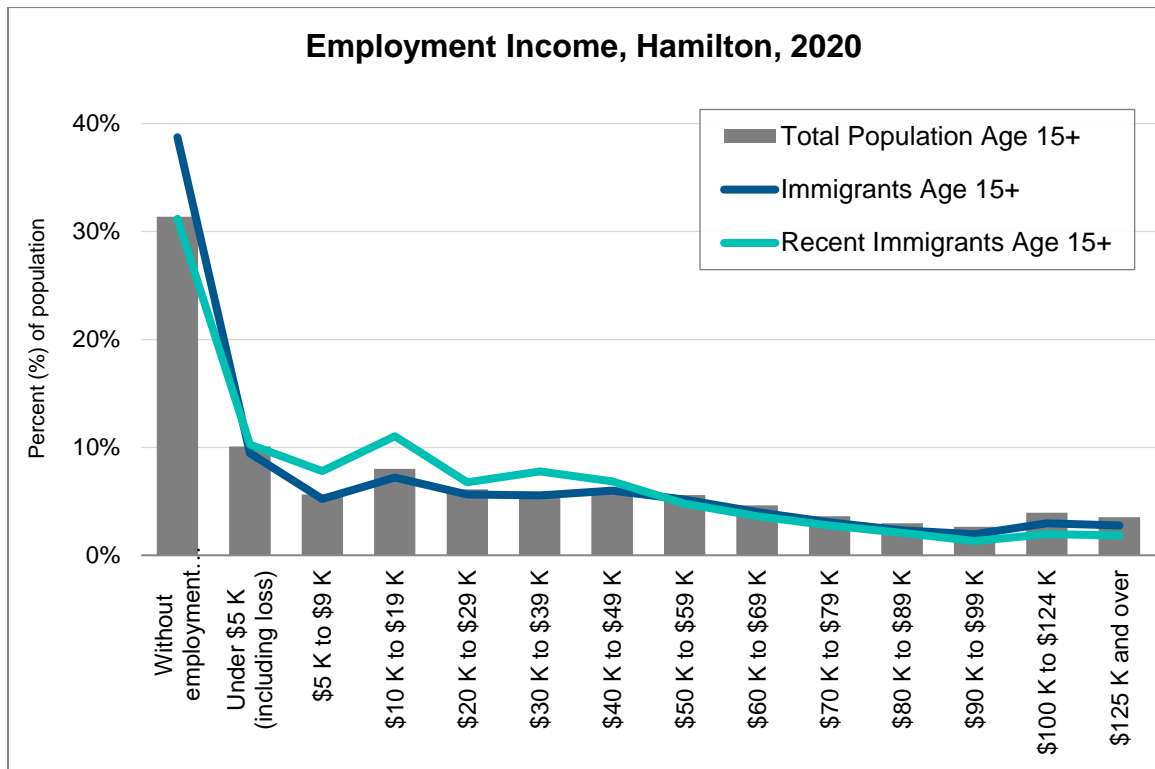
- Among recent immigrants, women were more likely than men to have incomes below \$20,000 and less likely to have incomes over \$30,000.



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Employment Income Categories

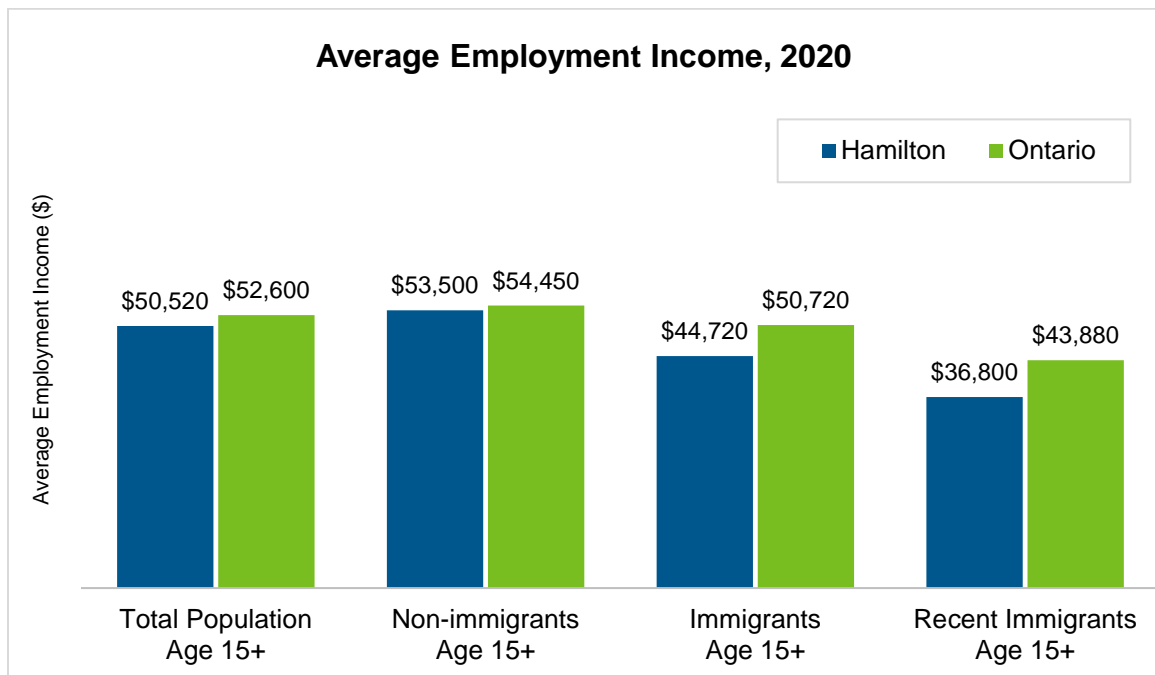

Average Employment Income

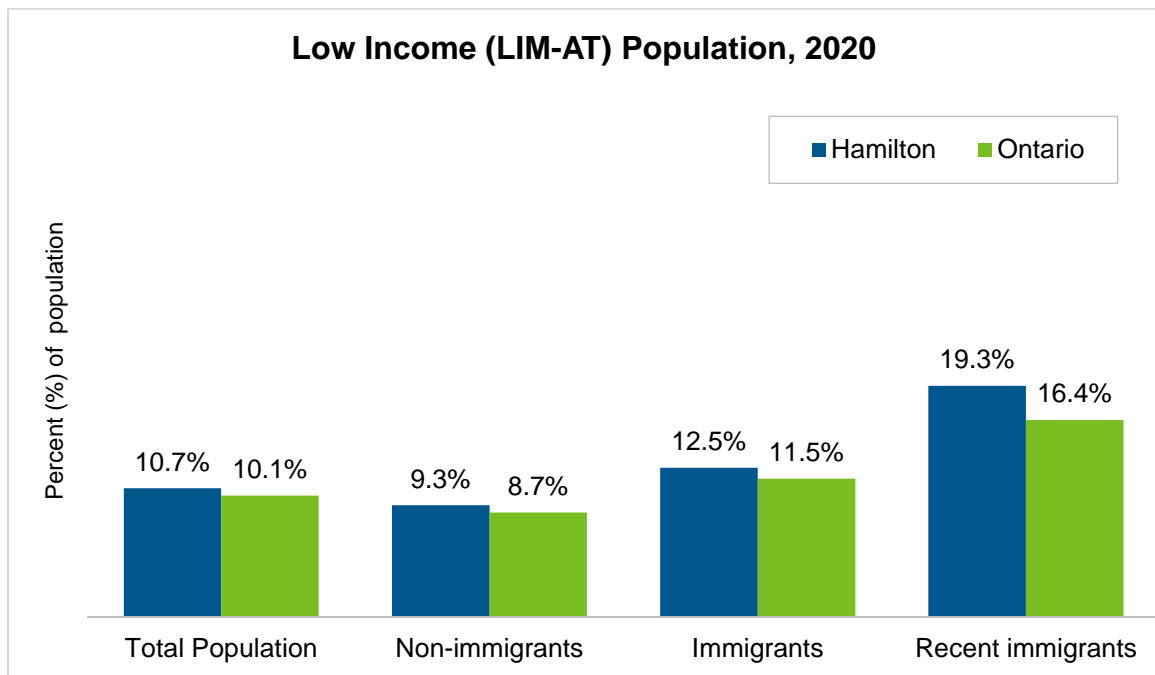
- Both in Hamilton and Ontario, recent immigrants had an average employment income that was substantially lower than those of all immigrants and the total population.
- In Hamilton, the average employment income of recent immigrants was 18% lower than that of all immigrants and 28% lower than that of the total population.
- In Hamilton, there was a 13% difference between the average employment income of immigrants and the total population.

Low Income (LIM-AT) Population

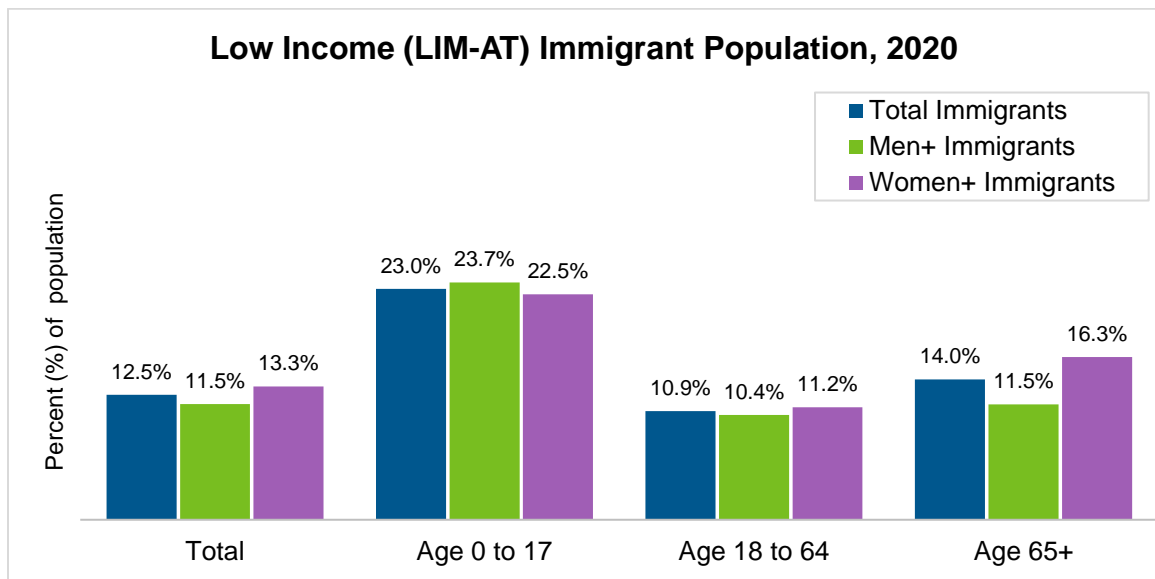
- More than one in 10 people in Hamilton and Ontario lived in low-income situations.
- Among recent immigrants in Hamilton, close to 20% lived in low-income situations, a figure that almost double the low-income rate for the total population.
- Hamilton had higher rates of recent immigrants living in low-income situations compared to Ontario.



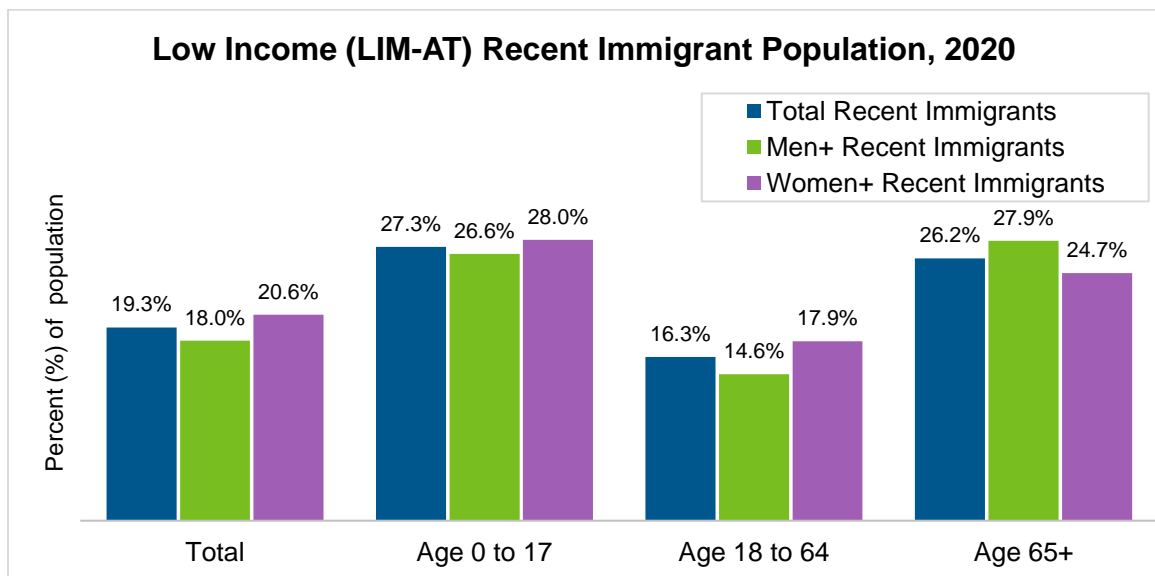

Low Income (LIM-AT) Population by Age and Gender

- In Hamilton, immigrant women were more likely to live in low-income situations than immigrant men. This was true across all age groups, except those 0-17 years of age.
- Among recent immigrants, women were more likely to live in low-income situations compared to men, except among those who were 65 years or older.
- Overall, immigrant and recent immigrant children (0-17 years of age) are the most likely to live in low-income situations.

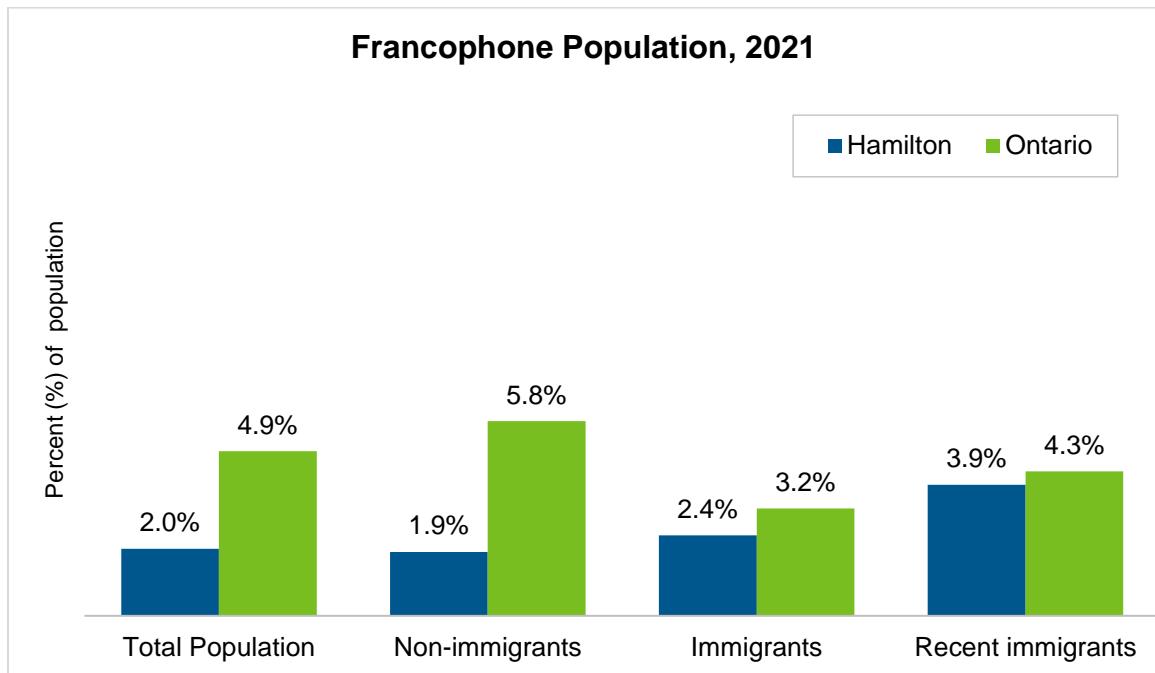

Francophone Population

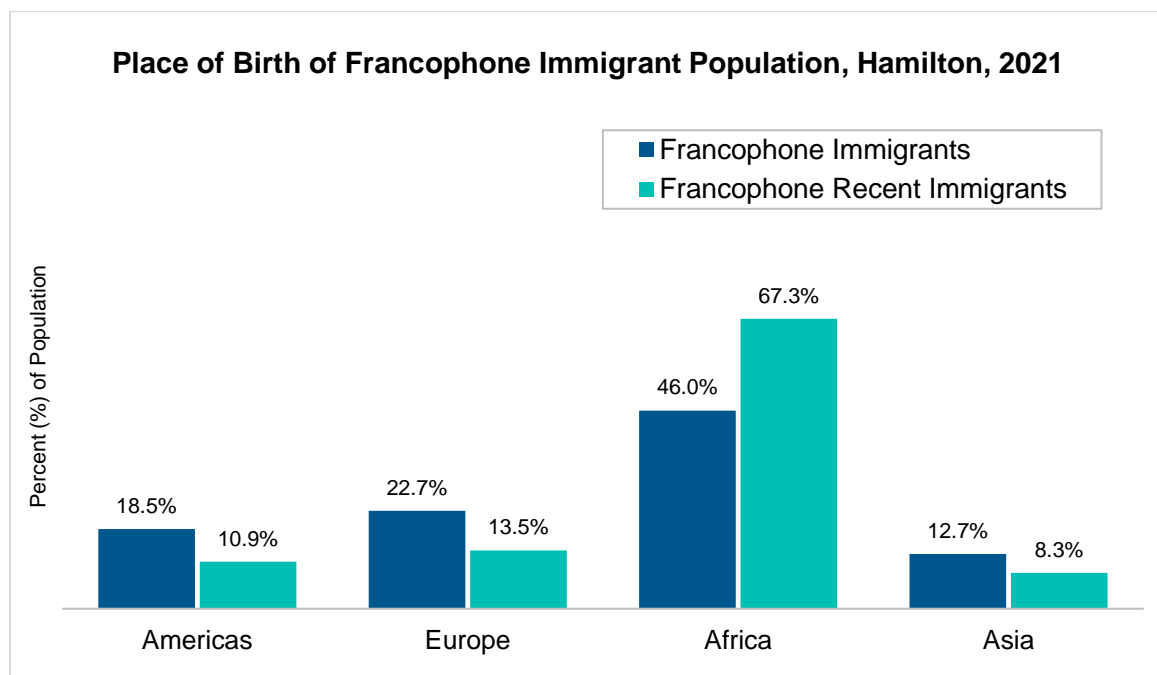
- In Hamilton, 2% of the total population, 2.4% of all immigrants and 3.9% of recent immigrants were Francophone. These were lower proportions compared to Ontario.

- Africa continues to be the top source region of Francophone immigrants in Hamilton with 46% of francophone immigrants and 67.3% of recent francophone immigrants from Africa.
- Compared to all Francophone immigrants, smaller proportions of recent Francophone immigrants came from Americas, Europe and Asia.

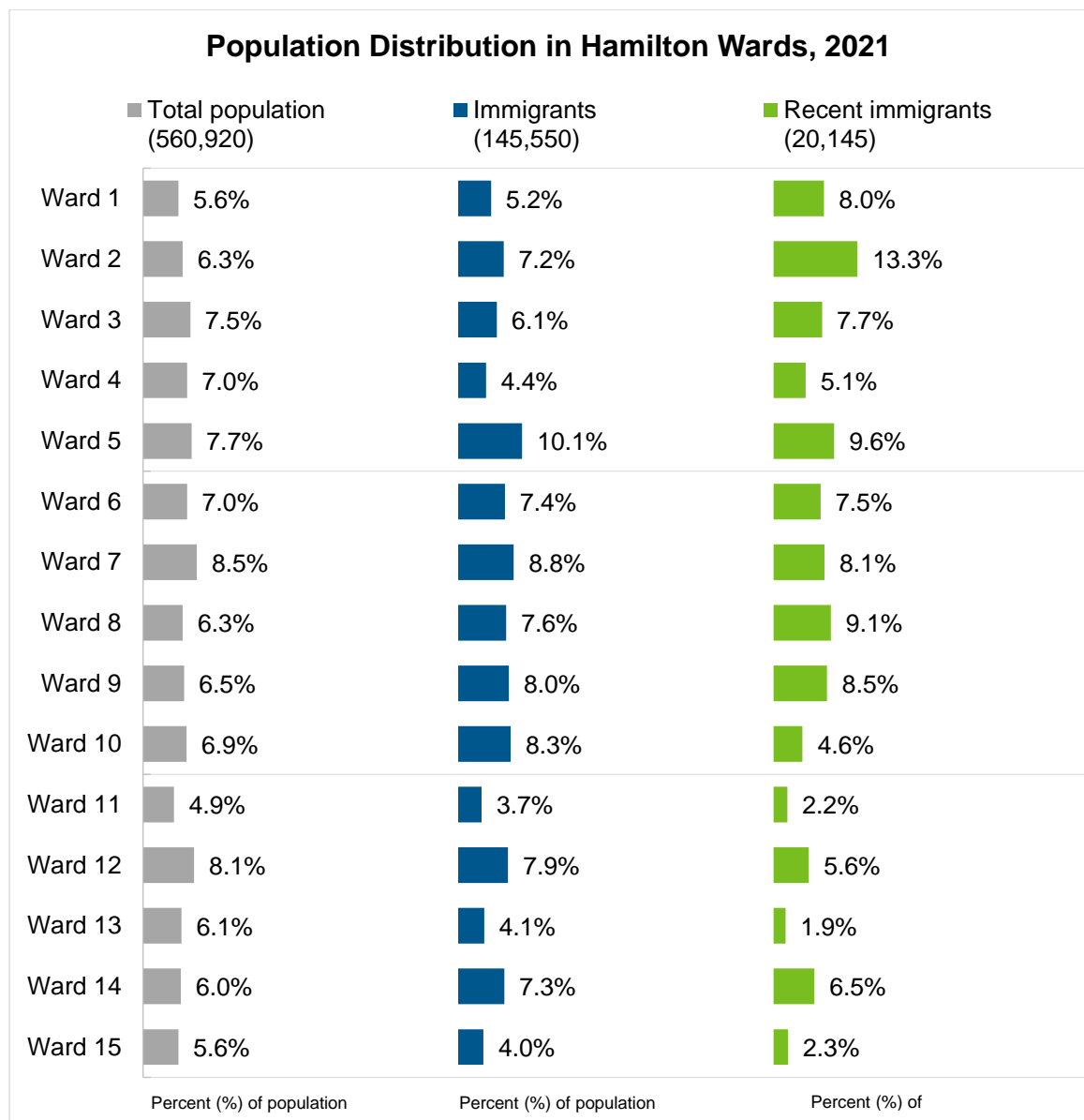

Population Distribution in Hamilton Wards

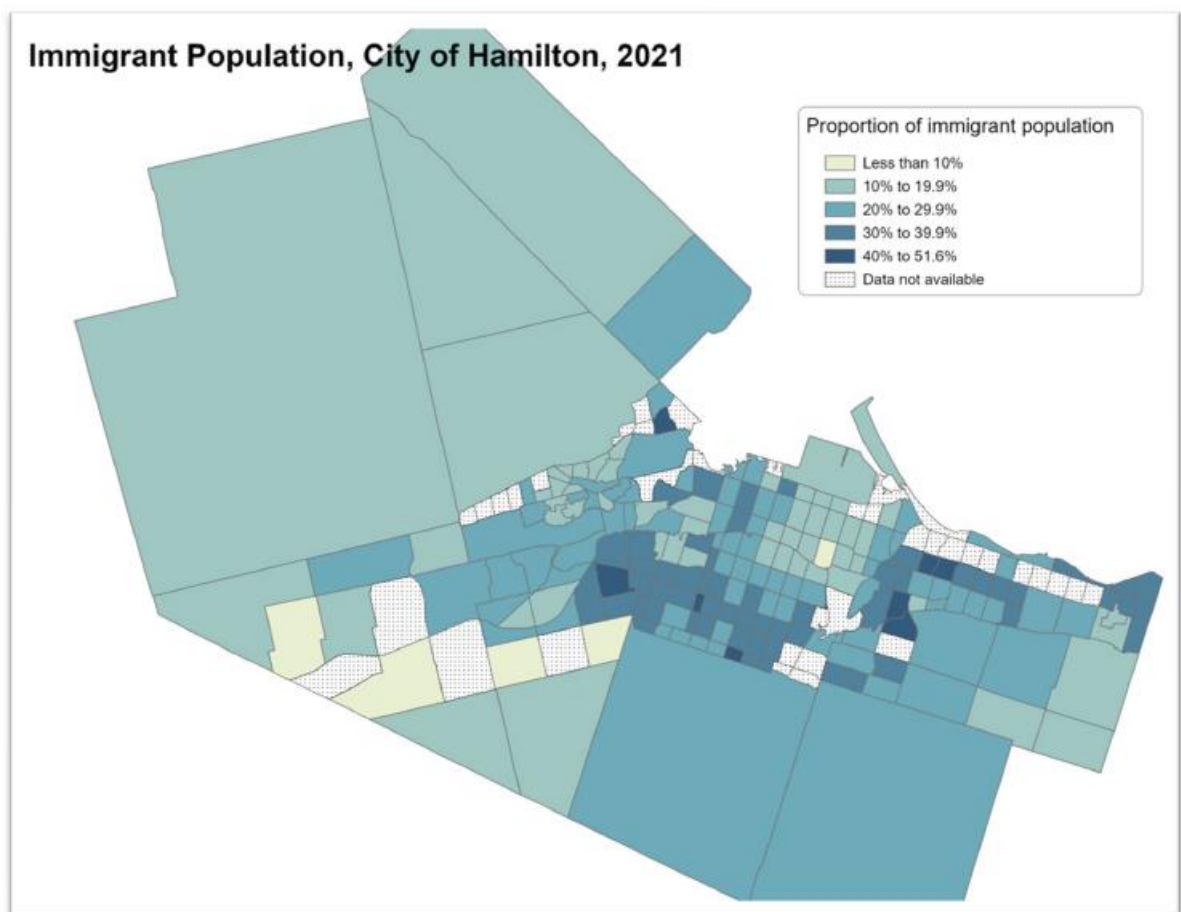
- Recent immigrants were most likely to reside in Ward 2 (13.3%), followed by Wards 5, 8, 9 and 7.
- Immigrants overall are distributed across the city, with the highest proportions in these wards: 10.1% lived in Ward 5, 8.8% in Ward 7, 8.3% in Ward 10, 8% in Ward 9, and 7.9% in Ward 12.



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Proportion of Immigrant Population, City of Hamilton, 2021

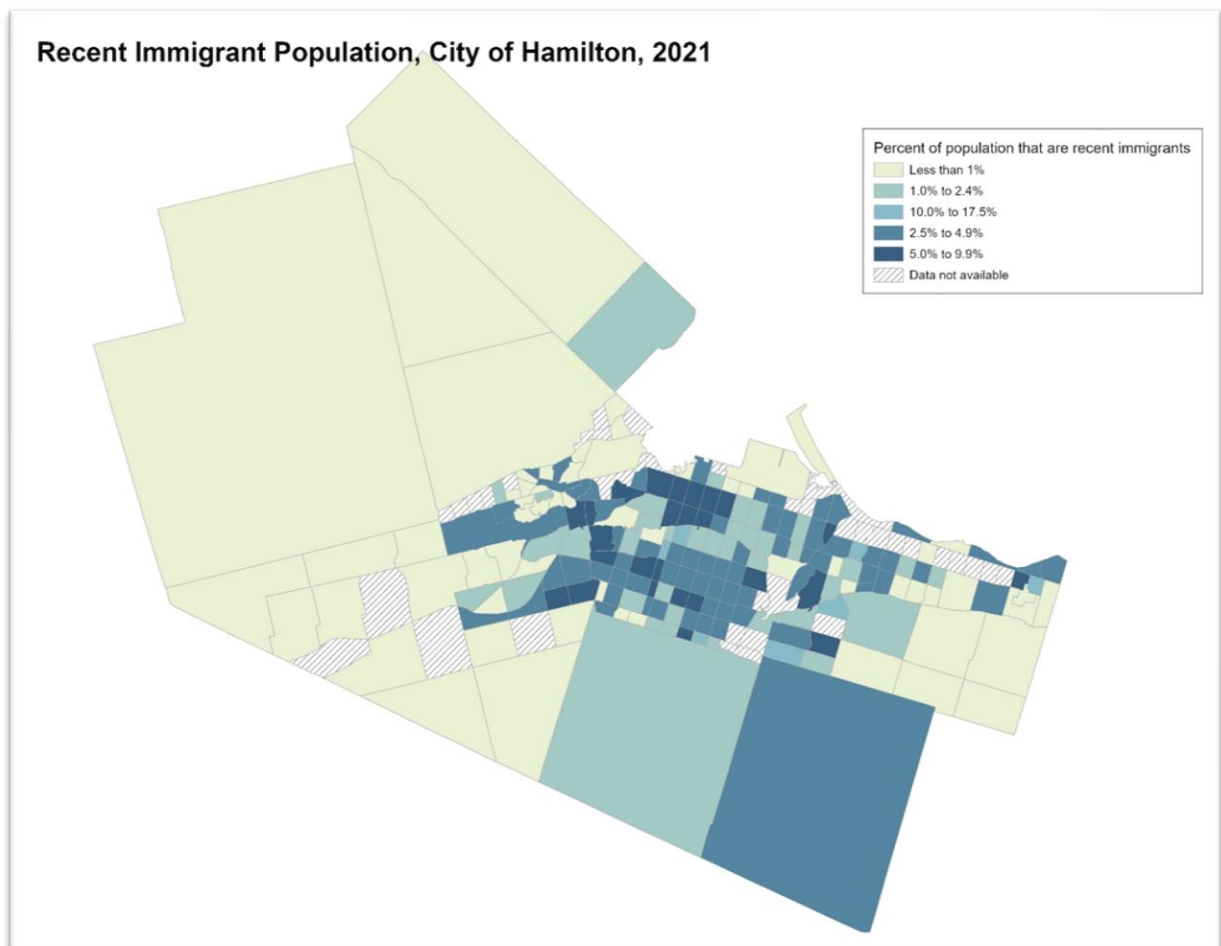
- The proportion of immigrant population refers to the percentage of immigrants living within each marked neighbourhood boundary.
- Immigrants make up at least 10% of the population in most neighbourhoods in the city of Hamilton. In some neighbourhoods, they exceed 40%.
- The areas of Hamilton with the highest concentrations of immigrants tend to be in lower city (in and around downtown), west and east mountain (Mohawk College and Lime Ridge Mall), and in the east end of the city (Eastgate Mall).

Proportion of Recent Immigrant Population, City of Hamilton, 2021

- Downtown neighbourhoods across Wards 1, 2 and 3 provide the largest grouping of neighbourhood boundaries with higher proportions of recent immigrants.
- Recent immigrants form more than 5% of the population in more than 25 of the City's neighbourhoods. These are found across the city, ranging from Ancaster to Stoney Creek.



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
